ATTAIN IN 21 DENSELY POPULATED

General Report of Census Shows 649 Persons to Square

CHARLOTTETOWN, April 20.—Although a
reduction occurred in the
number of aliens living in Great
Britain, the number of Americans
were increased almost 50
percent in 10 years. This is dis-
cussed in the general report of the
census of England and Wales.
The population for the first time today
exceeded 40 million. The number of
aliens fell from 790 per 10,000
in 1911 to 602 in 1921, but the num-
ber of Americans increased from
19,171 to 28,000.

The total population of England
and Wales numbered 37,886,099,
of whom there were 18,075,239 males
and 19,811,460 females. Its densi-
ty is 649 persons to the square
mile, or about an acre per head—
less than that of any other
country in the world for which
figures are available. Nearly
10 percent of the population live
in urban areas.

Plus women increased from
11,460,000 in 1911 to 17,000,000
in 1921. The effect of the
war is shown in the deple-
ment of males at early adult ages,
the deficiency of very young
males of both sexes. Families
smaller than 10 years ago, the
number of all men taken together
only 127 children each.
The number of children married
has increased from 16 to 18.
The Welsh language is shown to
be gradually dying out.

ing Government ects Demands of Soviet Russia

(Canadian Press)
MOSCOW, April 20.—Rejection by
the government of the demands
of the Russian Soviet govern-
ment in connection with the
Soviet buildings in the em-
bassy compound at Peking is re-
ported in a despatch to the Indo-
China agency. The raid on the
northern Chinese am-
bassy was carried out on April
19.

Two days after the raid the
government ordered all the
Soviet officials to leave and to
deliver to the Chinese
"affaires" at Moscow made
demands. These in-
clude immediate evacuation
of the compound,
release of all those arrested
during the raid and the return
of documents seized, together
with money, personal property,
gold goods and books taken
from the compound.

DISCOVER CURE FOR ANEMIA

Physicians Successful After Ten Years of Experimenting.

(Canadian Press)
ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 20.—
Man today proclaimed a new vic-
tory over disease with the an-
nouncement that within a few
weeks there will be ready for pub-
lic use a cure for anemia that has
been successful in ninety out of
one hundred and nine cases.

The announcement was made by
Dr. George R. Whipple, Dean of the
medical school of the University
of Rochester, after ten years of ex-
perience in which he has been as-
sisted by Mrs. Frieda S. Robbins,
psychologist at the school. For
the past two years Dr. George R.
Whipple and Dr. Edwin J. Cohen of
Harvard Medical School have col-
laborated with them.

The cure is a serum discovered
during a decade of experimenting
with anemic dogs and humans.
It is an extract of beef liver but
has not yet been sufficiently puri-
fied to make chemical identifica-
tion or naming possible. It will
be distributed through selected ph-
ysicians in the various cities as
was done with insulin.

Church Property Split In Dominion

TORONTO, April 20.—Properties
of the Presbyterian Church in Can-
ada from coast to coast and the
pension funds of the church are
divided between the non-concur-
ring Presbyterians and the United
Church of Canada in an order of
commission handed down today.

Slightly more than 22 per cent. of
the total assets of the pension
funds of the Presbyterian Church
are to be handed to the non-con-
curring congregations under the
order, and the continuing church al-
so receives the charters of Knox
College, Toronto, and the Presby-
terian College, Montreal, and the
two college buildings themselves
already had been given into the
non-concurring congregations by
the legislatures of Ontario and
Quebec. It is estimated that the
continuing church now possesses
approximately 50 per cent. of the
college assets held by the Presby-
terian Church in Canada before union.

31 PER CENT OF ASSETS

It is estimated that out of assets
totalling approximately \$10,500,000
held by the Presbyterian Church
at union, property and funds valued
at \$3,291,000, or about 31 per cent.
of the whole, have been awarded to
the non-concurring Presbyterians.
This concerns property and capital
funds only.



all-night bivouacs on the beaches
being prominent features. The
water temperature at most of the
seaside resorts was abnormally
high for the middle of April, and
gay summer frocks, sun-shades,
bathing suits and ice cream cones
were other out-of-season items on
the holiday menu.

on the long walk at Windsor to see
