LEGISLATURE IN COMMITTEE YESTERDAY

Provincial Legislature, March 14. The House met at 4 p. m. with the Deputy Speaker (Mr. Heath Strong K. C.) in the chair. Mr. Allen presented a petition from the Town of Summerside for an Act to Amend the Summerside Incorporation Act 1903; and also an Act to Amend the Summerside Waterworks and Sewerage Act.

On motion of Hon. Mr. MacPhee, an Act to Amend the Children of Unmarried Parents' Act was received and read.

On motion of Hon. Mr. McPhee the House resumed committee reading, with Mr. W. A. Stewart in the chair, of the Amusement Tax Act.

The penalty clause providing for a fine of "not less than \$20 and not more than \$500" for violation of the statute was discussed at some length. On motion of Mr. J. A. MacDonald the minimum penalty was reduced to \$10.

The bill was reported agreed to with amendment. On motion of Mr. T. A. Campbell the House went into committee with Mr. Allen in the chair on second reading of an Act to empower Barclays Trust Company of Canada to do business in Prince Edward Island.

The promoter explained that the company in question was duly incorporated in the Province of Quebec. There was some doubt whether a Company incorporated in another Province could do business in this Province without incorporation by the local Legislature; and it was to obtain recognition of their corporate capacity to do business here that Barclays Trust Company was seeking the present legislation.

Hon. Mr. MacPhee suggested a difficulty which might arise if under the Quebec incorporating statute powers were conferred, for example to make trust investments, which this Legislature might not be prepared to grant, and which in the circumstances might constitute special privileges.

After discussion an amendment, on motion of Hon. Mr. McPhee, was made to Sec. 1 of the bill, granting corporate powers to the company "subject always to the general laws of Prince Edward Island regarding trusts and trustees."

The bill, after further discussion, was agreed to. Charlottetown Hospital Bill

On motion of Hon. Dr. MacMillan Rule 63 requiring publication in the Royal Gazette 4 weeks before the introduction of a bill vesting property, was suspended, and on Hon. Dr. MacMillan's motion the House then went into committee, with Mr. Hunter in the chair, on second reading of an Act to incorporate the Charlottetown Hospital.

The preamble sets forth that the Charlottetown Hospital, a Diocesan Institution built and maintained by the Catholics of the Diocese of Charlottetown was formerly conducted and operated by a Religious Order called the Sisters of Charity or the Grey Nuns whose Mother House is in the City of Quebec. By Cap. XVII of 47 Victoria the community of Sisters of Charity in Charlottetown were constituted in a body corporate by the name of "The Charlottetown Hospital." After the said incorporation, certain lands, being part of the lands on which the present Charlottetown Hospital buildings are now erected were conveyed to the Hospital. In or about the year A. D. 1925, the Sisters of Charity or Grey Nuns severed their connection with the Charlottetown Hospital, and the Charter of Incorporation is now forfeited and of no effect. The present legislation is being sought in order to vest the property in the Charlottetown Hospital under its present charter.

There was a good deal of ivy at Sandringham, as King Edward was fond of it, but now there is not so much. The Queen has often been seen removing it or supervising its removal.

It is related that on one occasion armed with a pair of shears, she stripped the ivy from the cottage of one of the estate workers. She did it in business-like style and kept her ladies-in-waiting busy clearing it away.

The occupier and his wife were out at the time. When the wife returned to see most of the ivy

gone and the Queen at work on her Majesty explained that she thought the cottage would look better and be more healthy without it, and said: "I hope you do not mind."

Her Majesty thinks that old walls look more imposing when bare than when covered with ivy. At Humstanton, in the "Garden of Rest" is a ruin which was once covered with ivy. One day the Queen visiting the garden, remarked to the gardener that it would look better if the ivy were removed.

Later this was done, exposing a fine old wall. There is no doubt that the Queen was right. "The Queen," said the gardener here, "knows as much as many head gardeners do."
