counts of the real estate, pay taxes and invest moneys or at any rate deposit these moneys in the bank and do work of that kind. He understood that man was an excellent servant of the estate and he would have to be retained. Apart from this he wanted to know what would be saved on the administration of the estate.

MR. JOHNSTON said that although not a promoter of the bill nor a signer of the petition, he had had occasion to look into the matter, and he thought that the scheme that was being propounded was a most excellent one. The late Mr. Connolly was at one time, he understood, worth some \$700,000, whereas at the present time the estate amounted to about \$170,000. The will provided that there should not at any time be fewer than three trustees, but for eight or nine years there was only one trustee. By making the trustees a body corporate, the Board would have to meet regularly and it would no longer be an individual matter among the trustees but on every question in connection with the administration of the estate there would have to be a consensus of opinion. There were about 25,000 Irish Roman Catholics in the province, he said, and they were all deeply interested in the estate.

MR. SAUNDERS said he did not think there was an Irishman in P. E. Island who knew very much about the Connolly estate, a matter that was vitally important to them. If it was true that the estate was at one time worth \$700,000, that money invested at 4 per cent. would mean a sum of \$28,000, sufficient to educate 200 boys, and that number being educated.

MR. STEWART said that if there were any depreciation in the estate, that was a matter that could be remedied in the courts; but he thought it was a mistake to make the statements that had been made in this regard, as they seemed to cast a reflection on the character or prominence of men in this county, and some of whom were not able at present to defend themselves.

THE PREMIER thought that there had been no intention on the part of to throw discredit on anybody. The remarks rather indicated an uncertainty as to the value of the estate, in which the public were interested, and he was sure he voiced the sentiments of hon. members that there was no intention to cast any reflection on those who had held such high positions.

The House adjourned until three o'clock.

AMERICANS RUSH REINFORCEMENTS TO FRONT

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Transportation of American troops to France is already proceeding at the accelerated rate contemplated by the speeding up measures taken after the battle of the Picheray began. Acting Secretary Crowell made this statement today, but would give no details.


Word that American reinforcements are moving to the support of the Allies in Picardy, has revived argument in Germany over the efficacy of the submarine, and drawn from Captain Persius, military critic of the Berliner Tagblatt, the comment that after being persuaded to underestimate America German opinion is undergoing a change.

MORE HEAVY BLOWS ARE YET IN STORE

LONDON, April 9.—Perry Robertson, cabling from British headquarters in France, says: "Though no official statement is made as to the number of prisoners taken by us in the course of the battle they must now amount to quite respectable figures."

The Germans, I notice, go on claiming prisoners with such rapidity that they will very soon have taken more prisoners than we have troops. Prisoners continue to speak of the tragic character of their losses, but more intelligent of these declare the Germans will go on hammering regardless of losses because she must force a peace this year. If she does, assuredly she is likely, according to the grim joke, to need all the ground she wins in which to bury her dead and the awful utilization factory will have no lack of horrid raw material. Whether her hammering will continue on the same front is a matter for conjecture. Though one may talk lightly there must be no misunderstanding that whether on this front or on another, more heavy blows are in store, and the nation at home must face whatever comes with the same great spirit being shown by the army.



Black's Sunnyside

ACTIVITY ROUND MONTDIDIER

(Special to The Guardian)

PARIS, April 10.—(Special)—Violent artillery fighting occurred during the night, at various points north of Montdidier and also between Montdidier and Noyon. It is announced officially. No infantry action developed.

The French advanced troops south of the Oise river withdrew to prepared positions southwest of the river forest of Couchy and south of Couchy-Le-Chateau.

The statement follows: "There was great activity on the part of the artillery on both sides at numerous points, along the front north of Montdidier and between Montdidier and Noyon. No infantry action occurred."

"In the left bank of the Oise, there were intermittent bombardments, advanced French troops, in conformity with orders which had been given, carried out a withdrawal to prepared positions southwest of the lower forest of Couchy, and south of Couchy-Le-Chateau. German troops were kept constantly under the French artillery fire, and suffered heavy losses in the course of the operation."

"The German raids north of Rheims, were repulsed. Other German efforts against small French posts, near Eparges in the sector of Reillon and north of Bonhomme achieved no greater success. Every where else the night passed in calm."

The House resumed at 4 o'clock, when consideration of a bill was continued. Clause 7, providing that 2 years' absence from the province should disqualify a trustee, was struck out after consideration, being considered unnecessary.

The bill was afterwards reported agreed to.

THE PREMIER moved the second reading of the following bill and after some time spent in committee progress was reported. Paragraph 2 is to give the magistrate control over juveniles loitering after 8 o'clock at night.

Paragraph 3 increases the rate of interest which the government has now to pay on temporary loans from 4 to 5 per cent.

This bill reads as follows:—

BE IT ENACTED by the Lieutenant Governor and the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as "The Statute Law Amendment Act 1918."

2. Subsection "G" of Section 2 of the Act 10, Edward VII. Chapter 15 is hereby amended by inserting in the twenty-first line thereof after the word "code" the following words "or who is found after the hour of eight o'clock at night in or loitering about any moving picture theatre, vaudeville entertainment or theatre of any kind not accompanied by his parent or guardian or by some person with the consent of such parent or guardian or is an habitual truant and whose parent or teacher represents that he is beyond control or who habitually uses obscene, profane or indecent language" or who is guilty of immoral conduct in any place whatsoever or who is kept in a home which by reason of neglect, immorality, depravity, disease or unsanitary conditions is an unfit place for such child to live in.


3. Section One of the Act 57 Victoria Cap 6, is hereby amended by striking out the word "four" in the last line of such Section and inserting in lieu thereof the word "five."

The House then adjourned until 8 o'clock.

On resumption the Premier moved the second reading of the Prohibition

Bill, and after some discussion, the House went into committee of the whole to consider it. At 10 o'clock progress was reported. The House then adjourned until 10 a. m. this morning.
