THE STEAMER COBAN ASHORE NEAR SYDNEY

Attempt Will Be Made To Float Her---Latest News from Stranded C. P. R. Steamer Mount Temple, Which is Being Examined By Divers---Saving Cargo

SYDNEY, Dec. 3. (Special) - Steamer Coban, McNeill, from Halifax for Sydney in ballast, ran ashore last night at Cranberry Head while trying to make port. Thick snow squalls prevailed accompanied by a fifty mile westerly gale. As the result of yesterday's southerly easterly storm the ship was carried well upon shore. Tugs will attempt to float the stranded steamer.

TO PREVENT THE JAP EMIGRATION TO AMERICA

The Attention of the Mikado's Government Called to Student Laborers

TOKIO, Dec. 2. - It is understood that United States Ambassador O'Brien has officially called the attention of the Japanese Government to the great increase in the number of Japanese arriving on the Pacific Coast. He presented the view of the State Department that this cannot be considered in accordance with the promises of the Japanese Government and therefore requested a right investigation with prompt measures to prevent the emigration to America, of any student, who might afterwards become a laborer.

ABDUCTION OF ROMAN MARQUIS BY BANDITS

Who Kidnap Him and Take Him to Cave and Torture.

NAPLES, Dec. 2. - A dramatic and sensational kidnaping has occurred here, the victim being Marquis Giuseppe Cito, a member of the most ancient aristocracy and a cousin and aide of the king. The Marquis was seized and carried off to a grotto where he was tortured and a letter to the Marchioness demanding \$500 extorted from him. He was found half frozen and badly injured and his condition is now considered desperate. One of his assailants was disguised as a policeman.

Clark the first defendant, was fined five thousand dollars for combining with P. A. Prince of Calgary and others to prevent or lessen competition in the manufacture of lumber. The defense will appeal to the supreme court.

TWENTY-FIVE BODIES FOUND IN NOAMI MINE

Believed This is All the Casualty List As the Rescuers Have Gone Nearly to the End of the Workings and Found No Signs of Life

PITTSBURG, Dec. 3. (Special) - The bodies of twenty-five miners caught by an explosion of fire damp Sunday night in the Noami mine of the United Coal Company, located near Fayette City thirty-five miles south of this city, had been reached by rescuers at 4 o'clock this morning. The rescuers are now nearing the end of the workings and they have found no signs of life anywhere. In the opinion of the owners of the mine, few if any more victims will be found.

LONGSHOREMEN'S STRIKE SETTLED LAST NIGHT

Arrangement Made Between Men and the Steamship Co. on Compromise

Sr. JOHN, N. B., Dec. 3. (Special) - The longshoremen's strike was settled tonight. An arrangement was made between the men and the steamship companies whereby the scheduled rate of 32 cents an hour will be paid. The men have been getting 30 cents and asked 40. The strike began a week ago last Friday and since then over a hundred men have been brought in from outside. Some seven hundred dollars have been paid out in license. The City has agreed to lend this money to the steamship people, who in turn will send the outsiders home.

NOT GUILTY VERDICT FOR MRS. BRADLEY

Insanity Was Mrs. Bradley's Defence for Shooting Ex-Senator Brown

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3. (Special) - The jury in the case of Mrs. Annie Bradley on trial for the murder of former Senator Brown of Utah, which retired for deliberation shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon returned a verdict of "not guilty" today. Mrs. Bradley shot Brown, by whom she had three children, because he had refused to marry her after she had procured a divorce for her husband. Insanity was her defence.

New York, December 2. - The board of directors of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research of this city have announced an additional gift from John D. Rockefeller, of \$2,600,000. The money is to form an endowment fund, the proceeds of which may be used in any way the directors see fit. It is understood that the recent success in discovering a remedy for cerebro-spinal meningitis, which followed a lengthy investigation under the guidance of Dr. Simon Flexner, director of the Institution was largely responsible for Mr. Rockefeller's gift.
