Pontoon Bridge Plan Over Hudson Given Up

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—The project of building a pontoon bridge across the Hudson, the pontoons to be wooden ships, has been abandoned. It met with great opposition, but according to George A. Post, president of the company which backed the proposal, this was not the cause of relinquishment. Mr. Post said that Chairman Lasker of the Shipping Board laid down on September 15 conditions which could not be met, namely, that the company must take up or give up its option on the ships within twenty-four hours and pay for them immediately. This Mr. Post said, could not be done, as neither Congress nor the War Department had sanctioned the bridge undertaking, and the company could not buy ships until it was certain it could make use of them. The suggested price was \$2,400 a ship, and the company was thinking of buying fifty ships.

SCIENTIST IN ENGLISH UNIVERSITY ENDOWED WITH REMARKABLE GIFT

LONDON, October 18.—Miss Annie G. Cannon, an astronomer in an English University, is endowed with a remarkable gift of classifying the distances of stars in the spectrum almost at a glance, a feat that would otherwise require laborious measurement. She has thus classified 700,000 of them in a great catalogue now being published.

Referring to Miss Cannon's amazing scientific gift, Professor H. H. Turner, chief assistant of the Royal Observatory at Greenwich, declared yesterday that she is the only astronomer in the world who is able instinctively to identify stars by their spectra and that her work was of an immense value in solving the riddle of the universe.
