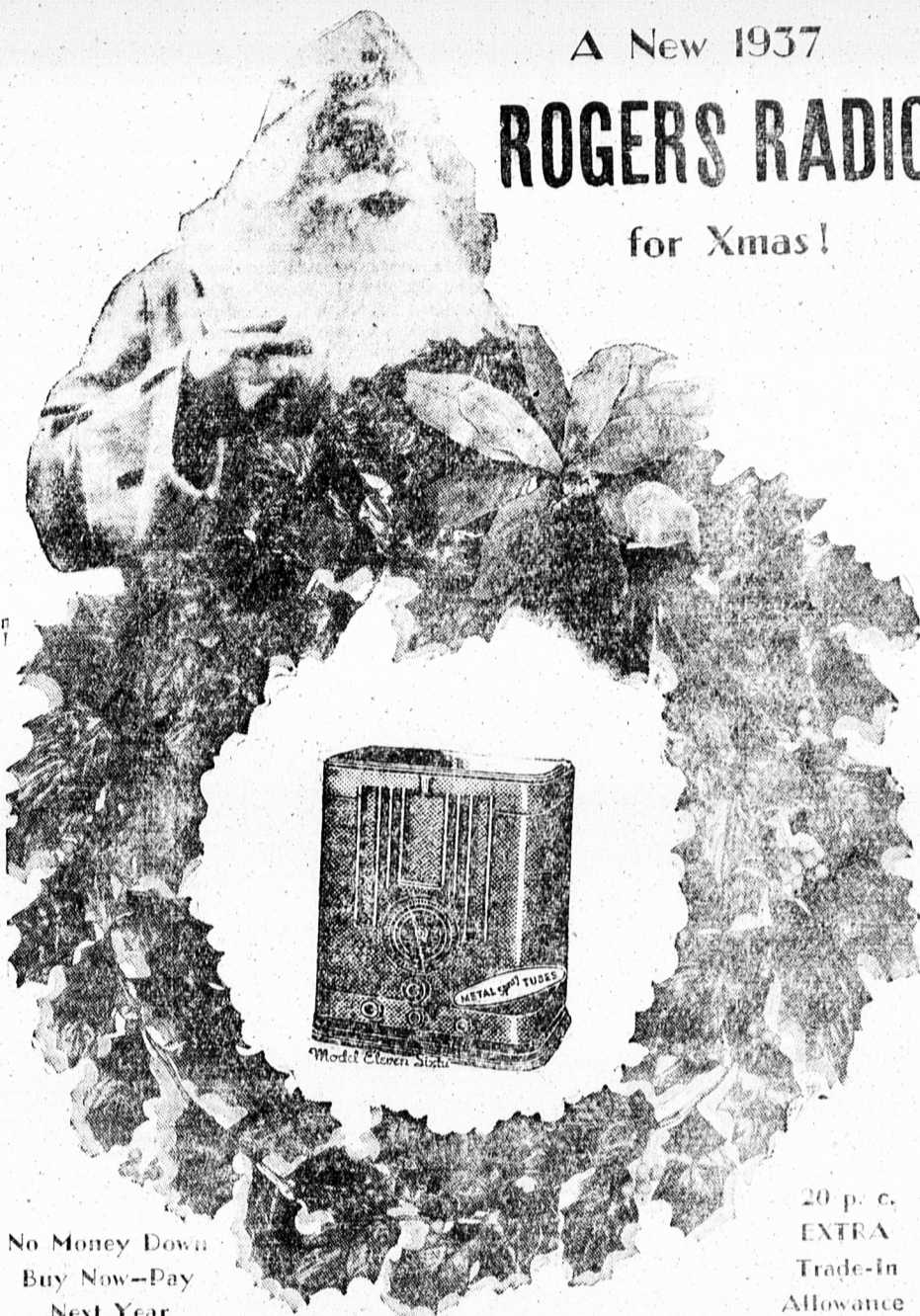

### In Memoriam

MR. EVERETT H. NICHOLSON

There passed peacefully away in the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Tuesday, Oct. 20th, 1936, Mr. Everett H. Nicholson, formerly of Borden. Mr. Nicholson had not been well for some time previous to his death, and had spent some three years in the Provincial Sanatorium, where his bright, happy personality was enjoyed by all who knew him.

He was born thirty-seven years ago at Hunter River. In his early years he became an employee of the Canadian National Railway, at which work he served as a section foreman for fifteen years prior to his illness. He was possessed of sterling qualities and was affectionately enjoyed by those with whom he labored.

He was married twice, his first wife being Miss Dorothy Pursey, who passed away some time ago. To them were born two children, Mary and Dorothy. He was later married to Miss Mildred Ferguson, and to them two sons were born, John and Everett.

He is survived by his sorrowing wife and four children; his mother Mrs. Mary Nicholson of Hunter River; three sisters, Mrs. Charles Ozier, Boston, Mass.; Mrs. Edward Saunders, Western Canada, and Mrs. Harry Pursey, North Rustico, and four brothers, James, Bathurst N.B.; Norman, Newport, Vermont; Robert, Boston, Mass., and Willard of Mayfield, P.E.I.

A short funeral service was held at MacLean's Funeral Parlors, Charlottetown at one o'clock on Friday, October 22nd, with Rev. G. Carlyle Webster officiating. Mrs. N. D. MacLean sang very appropriately "The Old Rugged Cross". Within the Hunter River Presbyterian Church at two o'clock that Sunday the regular service was held. Rev. G. Carlyle Webster officiated, with Rev. Howard A. Doig assisting. Favorite hymns of the deceased, "Abide With Me", and "Peace, Perfect Peace" were sung. Mr. Gordon Carew feelingly sang as a solo "Blessed Lights of Home". The pallbearers were Messrs. Leslie Stacey, Robert Nelson, Harry McLeod, William MacLeod, Arthur Duvar.

At the grave the Orange Order, of which the deceased was a member, conducted a service. Interment was made at the Hunter River cemetery.

### Presentation

On the evening of Monday, Nov. 9th a large number of the younger folk under the auspices of the Young People's Society of the Wood Islands Presbyterian Church assembled at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Murdock McPhee for the purpose of doing honor to Mrs. Angus Brown, Wood Islands (nee Miss Elizabeth McDougall, Deaconsess).

For upwards of a year before her marriage Mrs. Brown had been living at her old home in Belle River and during this period she as Vice President of the Young People's Society had been very active in assisting in all of the work of the Society. And while Mrs. Brown will continue to be a resident of Wood Islands and will also no doubt continue to take a certain amount of interest in the work of the Society, still knowing that she will in her new sphere of life be able to devote as much time and energy to the work as she has been doing the young people feel that this would be an opportune time to give expression to their appreciation of Mrs. Brown's services to the Society during the past year or more.

The earlier part of the evening was pleasantly spent in music and games. Later when all had assembled Rev. R. Hensley Stavert was elected chairman for the occasion. In a few well chosen words Mr. Stavert stated the purpose of the gathering. He then called upon Miss M. Belle McKay to read an address to Mrs. Brown. The address was a very flattering one and told of the splendid work done by Mrs. Brown, not only in the interests of the Young People's Society but in the interests of the Sunday School as well, and of how greatly her services will be missed at such time as she will not be able to be present.

Shortly before the closing the reading of the address Miss Mary McPherson on behalf of the Young People's Society presented Mrs. Brown with a snug-sized purse. After Mrs. Brown had thanked her many friends for this kind expression of their appreciation of her services all joined in singing "For She's a Jolly Good Fellow". Mr. Angus Brown was present and at this time added his word of thanks on behalf of Mrs. Brown and the kindness of the young people to her.

Short addresses were then given by Messrs. Alex McLennan, Murdock McPhee, Harold Young, Wendall McMillan and Dawson McBeth and by Mrs. John A. Stewart, Miss Margaret Crawford, Miss Christine Gillis, Miss Grace McDougall and by the chairman, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert.

All stressed the value of the services rendered by Mrs. Brown to the Young People's Society. The music of the evening which was of a very high order was furnished by the Wood Islands Senders. Shortly before the gathering came to a close a vote of thanks was extended to them for their music and by them suitably acknowledged.
