Seaman Convicted On Assault Charge

HALIFAX, Oct. 14—(CP)—A Supreme Court jury here today convicted Harold Purim of Montreal on a charge of causing Hugh Felix of Halifax grievous bodily harm during a battle between members of two rival seafarers' unions on the Halifax waterfront April 8.

The jury deliberated 40 minutes. Pilgrim was remanded for sentence by Mr. Justice J. L. Lisley at the end of the court's current session.

Pilgrim previously had been charged with attempted murder by firing a loaded shotgun at Felix but the Grand Jury reduced this charge.

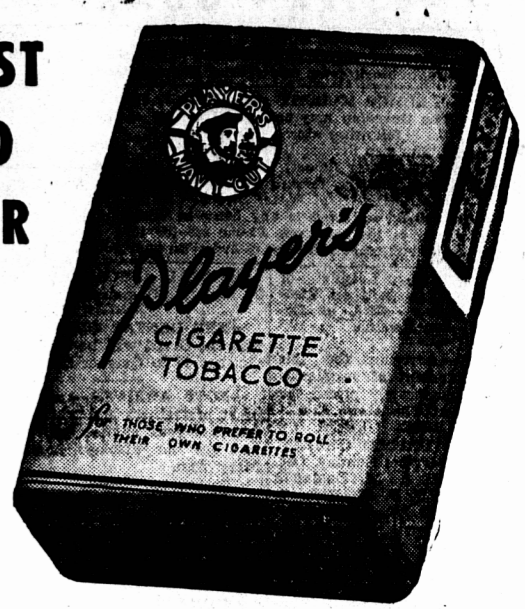
