BERWICK, March 29.—Word was received here by wire of the death this morning in Starke City, Florida, of Rev. Garrett Percy Raymond, pastor of the Baptist Church in that city, and a former pastor of the Berwick Baptist Church. He suffered a stroke about a month ago since which time his condition has been serious. He was 68 years of age and was born in Yarmouth, where his early life was spent. He was a graduate of Acadia University, his first pastorate being in New Germany, after which he held pastorates at New Glasgow, Annapolis Royal, Berwick and Charlottetown, P. E. I. He was an eloquent teacher and very successful in the work of the ministry. Mr. Raymond was prominent in the Sunday School work and also during his seven years pastorate in Berwick he was one of the founders of the Western Kings Memorial Hospital, and became its first president. While here he purchased a farm in Rockland and became a prominent orchardist. About seven years ago he moved to Florida where he was pastor at Starke City. It was while in Berwick that his first wife, formerly Miss Annie Sanford, of Weston, passed away. He later married Miss Mary Ruby McDonald of Halifax, who survives him. Three children; by the first marriage survive; Charles of Roseau, Northern Ontario; Harold of Halifax, and Harriet, a Missionary in the Philippines, home on furlough at present at Starke City, also three sons by the second marriage, George, Paul and Edward all at home at Starke City.

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(Written for the Canadian Press by Stuart McCawley) GLACE BAY, N. S. April 2.—Is it a question of pride or ignorance; or the turn-up-your-nose habit that is the cause of our people not enjoying herrings as a food?

We have right at our front door the most valuable fishing grounds on the Atlantic seaboard; and the loveliest and freshest and cheapest food in the world, yet we eat less fish than almost any other country in the world.

Canada catches 120 pounds of fish each year for every man, boy, woman and girl in this Dominion and we eat only 20 pounds. We have to find a market outside of Canada for the rest of the catch.

We home here serve fish not more than nine times a month. Great Britain eats twice as much fish as Canadians. Norway three and a half times as much. Even Germany eats one and a half times as much.

Why is it? Is fish too plentiful? Is fish too cheap? Do we know its value? Can't we cook it properly? Fish has been a standard food of men from the earliest history. It is a good food, wholesome, easily digested; it builds brain and muscle; makes bone and is cheaper than meat or fowl.

The fishing industry is a high brow and historical industry. The Carpenter from Nazareth, who built ships and gave the world its greatest lessons in virtue and good living, consorted with fishermen, picked his apostles from fishermen, told his great truths to fishermen, and left fishermen to carry on his gospel.

At the sea of Galilee the fish were fresh fish. The River Jordan is the drainage of three mountains and runs nine miles to the sea of Galilee, which is a big inland lake with 33 different varieties of fresh water fish. The barbel—like the catfish; the bream—like a big sun fish; the loach—something like our smelt; and lampreys, our eels.

Peter and Joseph of Arimathea sold no salt water fish. No cod, no haddock, or halibut or herring. The sea of Galilee empties into the Dead Sea, often meandering some 200 miles; so all the fish that Jerusalem had from Joseph and his crew were what we would look upon as inferior, fresh water, tasteless fish.

We are luckier than the apostles and the Jews of the Bible days in having real ocean fish for food. Yet somehow or other we don't seem to appreciate that blessing. Is it pride? Are we too high hat to appreciate fish?

The herring is our king fish. The fish we have the most of. The fish that is good fresh, corned, salted or smoked, and the fish that is the most wholesome, and has the greatest content of Vitamin D of any food in the catalogue. Moses and his forefathers called it herring.

The Romans called it clupea. We call it herring; it is of the same family as the shad. The gaspereau is a big herring. When the gaspereau is dried it becomes an alewife.

When the herring is a little chap and get tangled in the fish nets in the St. Croix River they put him in a can and he is called sardine. The herring is a great fish and very prolific. Some schools are from six to 20 miles square. He is always moving. They say he lives in the deep waters and comes to the coast about three times a year.

The herring lays somewhere about 50,000 eggs a year. The eggs are small and adhere, in masses, to seaweed and stones on the bottom. The shark and porpoise and gulls and haddock follow the herring schools and prey on them. He has only a few small teeth. He cannot capture active living creatures for food. But as he swims with quick nervous movements water is being continually strained through the gill-rakers. By this means great numbers of cape pods, mollusks and other fish larva are retained in the mouth and swallowed.

The Scandinavian fishermen catch and cure about two billion pounds of herring a year. Scotland handles about 250,000,000 pounds. The United States over 100,000,000 and Newfoundland and Canada about half that quantity. About 10 percent of the world's catch is eaten fresh, 25 percent used for bait in other fishing; and the balance is salted or smoked. Kippered herring has a big market in Europe. Nova Scotia has made a reputation for its smoked herring which is better known as "The D'gby Chicken." The Scotch "Cured" herring which is just gibbed and roused and keeps its milt and roe is in great demand by the
