Five High School girls who read the verses "Memories of 1857" most feelingly voiced the pupils' sentiments of gratitude and loyalty, joined with the appreciation and esteem of pupils and Sisters towards the Reverend Clergy and worthy citizens of Charlottetown who have ever, during sixty-nine years, warmly welcomed and supported the good Sisters and their work.
An interesting and instructive feature of the programme was the following essay, composed and read by Miss Catherine McCloskey of Grade X.
"Thoughts Suggested by Foundation Day."

times, the boy went to school to learn those arts and sciences, which would fit him for a position in the army, or in the state. The girl received little, or no education. In either case little attention was given to the spiritual side of the character. In the days of chivalry, perhaps the greatest ideals of public education was held—the bringing out of the best that was in the boy, being the principal object of his teachers. He received a training which fitted him to fill that conception which we have of a true man. Indeed, the development of moral character must always remain the highest ideal of Christian education.
To realize the benefits of an education, we would have to picture to ourselves, the state of a community, in which there were no schools, and in which the parents, never having had the advantages of education themselves had not the ability of properly instructing their children. Of course an education that will fit a boy or a girl, for his or her life-work now-a-days, must necessarily differ from that of past ages.
Today, a young man or a young woman must receive a training that will fit them for the busy, industrial world in which we live. It may be a matter of hard toil in the sweat of the brow, or a life of achievement, in comparative ease and comfort. At the present time there is little excuse for the boy or girl who will not take advantage of the educational opportunities offered them. Nothing can make us better appreciate the price at which these advantages have been bought, than a glance at the history of our school. Notre Dame Academy was founded in the year 1857, and we celebrate today, (Oct. 12.) its 69th anniversary. The Sisters of the Congregation of Notre Dame are the second oldest communities of Sisters in Canada—the Ursulines alone preceding them. The foundress, Marguerite Bourgeois, was born at Troyes, in France, April 17, 1620. She was very pious, and when Paul Chamy de Maisonneuve, the founder of Ville Marie (Montreal) invited her, when he was visiting Troyes, to go to Canada to teach its early settlers, she accepted with a glad heart. Her heroic zeal found expression in the opening of the first school on April 30, 1657, the building of a Chapel dedicated to Notre Dame de Bon Secours. In 1683, a mission was established at Mount Royal for Indian girls—the first success of its kind in Canada. Houses were opened at Pointeux-Trembles, at Lachine, at Champlain and Chateau Richer. Another mission was established at Sainte Famille, on the Island of Orleans. This was so successful that the Bishop of Quebec, invited the Sisters to open a house there, and in 1689, though Mother Bourgeois was sixty-nine years of age, she started immediately, on foot, on the long and perilous journey to Quebec.
Marguerite spent a life-time doing good deeds, and on the twelfth day of January, 1700, God called her to Himself, and we are all positive He said to her, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, Enter thou into the Kingdom of Heaven." At her death there were ten houses in the Dominion; there are now nearly two hundred spread over the whole of North America, under a Superior-General, who resides at the Mother House, Montreal. Charlevoix, a famous historian, says: "If to this day, quiet
