DUGAL INQUIRY

ANOTHER BOON

The intimation given by Premier Mathieson at the opening of the Summer School of Science, that provision is being made for the introduction of technical education in the Canadian schools, will not surprise those who have been watching the progress of events since the present administration assumed office.

The introduction of technical education into the Canadian schools is the logical sequence in the series of progressive educational measures that have followed close upon each other under the Borden Government.

The plans are not yet matured and we have only the hint given by Premier Mathieson, at the meeting above referred to, upon which to speculate as to what course shall be followed.

We presume that a grant will be made to each province on some such basis as that in the agricultural grant. It will be recalled that this was decided upon at the instance of our representatives at an interprovincial conference at Ottawa and that

a fixed minimum sum was allotted to each province, the balance being distributed according to population. We have every faith that the grant to our own province will be sufficient to revolutionize our industrial system and give our young men and women such opportunities as will place the natural advantages of our provinces in a much more favorable light, in comparison with the other provinces, than they are at present.

MOVING ON

The editors of the New Glasgow, N. S., News and the Charlottetown Guardian, sitting in their respective offices exchanged greetings in a pleasant though brief conversation yesterday over the newly installed telephone cable.

"So move we on." The impossibilities of a few years ago are one by one becoming accomplished facts. The world is gradually, almost imperceptibly, being revolutionized; its ends are being drawn together and, very soon, it will be but a small community; its now "remotest nations" will be near neighbors within reach of daily converse, even within sight of each other.

Thanks to the present Governments, federal and provincial, Prince Edward Island will shortly have a place on the map, be a part of the continent. Already in our telegraphic service, formerly very seriously handicapped, we have been placed in practically the same position as our maritime neighbors.

FUR FARMING IN CANADA

The second edition of Fur Farming in Canada, by Mr. Walter Jones B. A., B. S. A., has just been issued by the Canadian Commission of Conservation.

The second edition of 6,000 copies, has about 100 new pages and the statistics given are fuller and, in a few particulars corrected. It will be remembered that the first edition was exhausted within a short time and the demand for the new edition, even before its publication, was such as to necessitate a larger edition than had been provided for by the parliamentary grant.

Of the information given in this now world-famed book, which ranks with the best works on animal life, it remains only to congratulate our esteemed fellow Islander, Mr. Jones, on his achievement. The book is a credit to him and an invaluable au-

thority on that now most important topic fur farming.

There is much in it that we would gladly reproduce did space permit but the following quotations will give the reader some idea of its style and value especially to the fox breeder: "Stated in general terms, fur has become scarce because less is produced and more is used than ever before. The remarkable increase in the demand for costly furs in the past twenty years is due to a combination of causes. The population is growing. The relative number of people in the wealthy classes is increasing. Commerce and more efficient salesmanship have introduced furs all over the world so that their admirers and users are multiplied. Dame fashion, whose influence is predominant everywhere is responsible for a very heavy demand for certain kinds and only the best and scarcest are in high favor with her. Then, too, our growing cities which multiply the opportunities for gatherings and concourses, especially of the well-to-do classes, engender competitive habits in choosing personal adornments."

"The ever expanding areas of human settlements have caused some kinds of fur-bearers to retreat farther into the woods. The clearing away of the forests and the grazing of the natural covers by domestic animals have destroyed their haunts and exposed them to their enemies. Most interesting statistics are given showing the decreasing number of pelts and the increasing prices, the former ranging, in the case of the silver fox, from ten per cent. to 50 and 65 per cent.; the latter from ten to 50 per cent.

On the much discussed subject of "Imported Foxes," Mr. Jones, after noting the respective arguments of the exponents of imported or wild foxes and native P. E. Island stock, says: "There is much to be said on both sides. In our opinion, however, the prime killing of the wild stock after careful fattening would probably increase the value of the pelts 100 per cent. but they would still be less than half as valuable as the best grade of selected Island stock."

NOTES

An examination of the returns of the Ontario election indicates that the vote given for the Conservative candidates was larger than at the preceding contest, and the popular majority for the Government more marked. The recent investigation into the penitentiaries of Canada showed that in some there were abuses and that at any rate there was room for improvement. Now it is announced that Hon. Mr. Doherty, the minister of justice, is studying the question and that probably at the next session of Parliament legislation will be introduced bringing about reform. Among the suggested improvements is the classification of prisoners, so that the half-decent convict shall not be compelled to live in close contact with the hardened and impenitent one.
