Canadian Dairying Faces Big Problems

High Prices of Feed and Labour Create Difficult Situation—Our Cheese in High Esteem in British Market.

Co-operation has been the chief factor in the success that has been attained by the Canadian dairy industry. It was not until the development of co-operative cheese factories and creameries within the past 30 years that the markets for Canadian butter and cheese had more than a local importance. But for twenty years at least, Canadian cheddar cheese has held a premier place on the British market, the most important and exacting in the world. Canadian dairy butter has never been held in high repute by the export trade, and a distinct prejudice had to be overcome by the creameries. Consequently, butter has not attained the status of cheese in the markets of Great Britain, where both Danish and Irish butter normally command slightly higher prices. In 1917 there were 3,418 factories in Canada producing cheese, butter and condensed milk. These factories handled nearly 3,000,000,000 pounds of milk in that year. The value of the products marketed was more than \$41,000,000. Ontario and Quebec, combined, produced 97 per cent of the factory-made cheese and nearly 74 per cent of the creamery butter. But the western provinces are steadily increasing their output, especially of butter. As the need for restoring the fertility of the soil of the prairie becomes more urgent, dairying is certain to develop rapidly, for no other branch of farming is so useful for maintaining the productivity of the soil. The exceptionally high prices for feed and labour during the recent war years have given dairy farming a setback to the industry. The labour problem is, perhaps, especially difficult, for dairy farming demands skilled labour throughout the year. Even with the assistance of milking machines, cream separators, testers and other modern equipment the human element still remains the crucial factor, if the industry is to be successful. The Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture, the Agricultural Colleges and the leading dairymen of the country have been occupied with the solution of these problems. They are also taking active means to banish scrub stock and to find better methods for utilizing such by-products as skim-milk and whey. Under such leadership the solution of these and kindred problems may well be hoped for and Canadian dairying will continue to be one of our great national industries.

Gossip is Busy In Washington

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Secretary Lansing's enforced resignation continues to hold the attention of official Washington. Speculation as to the probable successor to the former Secretary of State is even subordinated to discussion of the sensational climax to the strained relations between President Wilson and the former Secretary of State, which now are known to have been in existence for more than a year. Such terms as "crisis" in the Cabinet are freely used and in a sense find color in the frank acknowledgment of Secretary Lane that he was equally responsible for the meetings to which the President objected, but the best information available indicates that there is no crisis, in the sense that more resignations are likely to resign; in fact, it has been stated at the White House that no more resignations are expected as a result of the incident. Opinion in Congress continues divided with opponents of the peace treaty supporting Mr. Lansing's position and taking of some action to determine how the executive business of the government is being conducted during President Wilson's illness. There is even talk of some sort of legislation to specifically define what constitutes the disability of a President, more clearly than is provided in the constitution. So far it is all in the realm of talk. The chief discussion seems to be whether President Wilson knew of the cabinet meetings which have been going on for three months until he wrote his letter asking for Mr. Lansing's resignation. Probably no one but the President himself and three or four persons were such a question specifically, but it is being pointed out in discussion of the incident that reports of the cabinet meetings have been printed regularly in the newspapers; that the President reads the papers every day, and that in some instances, at least, official action which the President took on some subjects was after those subjects had been discussed at the cabinet conferences.

HERBERT MORRELL KILLED IN MONCTON YARD

MONCTON, N. B. Feb. 18.—Herbert Morrell, an employe of the Canadian National Railways, was killed in the railway yard here this morning. He was run over by a shunter at about 9:45 o'clock and it was about 11:30 o'clock before his body was removed from the rail. It was necessary to use a crane to lift the tender of the engine before the body could be extracted. Morrell had been employed

by the railway since February 3, during the snow trouble period and was engaged along with other workmen in shovelling snow off the tracks. An engine was moving on the main track and Morrell stepped from this track on to track 1 where a shunting engine driven by Philip Cormier and fired by Herbert O'Brien was backing up slowly and hit Morrell. Two wheels on the truck of the tender passed over Morrell, killing him almost instantly and badly mutilating his body.
