LETTER TO SCHOOL SECRETARIES

The following circular letter has been forwarded to the Secretaries of the different school districts throughout the province with a request that it be read at the annual school meetings which will be held on Tuesday, June 18th. A copy has also been sent to every clergyman in the province with a request for their assistance and co-operation in raising the standard of the schools by urging upon the people the necessity of more liberal support for teachers.

The Secretary is requested to read the following letter at the Annual Meeting of the Ratepayers on June 18th, after the Annual Report of Trustees has been received and disposed of.

To the Ratepayers and Parents of Children:
Ladies and Gentlemen:

Today at your Annual Meeting you are called upon to vote supplies for the running of your school for the incoming year. As every one is aware the cost of living has become so great that the salaries formerly sufficient for the support of the teachers is now quite inadequate for board and clothing without providing anything over.

It is true that in a few districts board has been obtained at a rate below cost, but this cannot be depended upon, nor is it right that any one household should be obliged to do this. Last year 21 schools were unable to obtain teachers for the supplements voted at the Annual Meetings, and it was only after loss of valuable time and by the trouble of calling special meetings and increasing the votes that teachers were obtained.

During the year upwards of one hundred teachers left the Province to go west, where much larger salaries can be obtained and from information obtained at my office it is most probable that at the end of the present school year this number will be very greatly increased. Owing to the Military Service Act the number of male teachers has been reduced almost to the vanishing point and there is every indication that it will be impossible to

obtain teachers, male or female, for all the schools unless a salary sufficiently large to hold them is offered, and to provide this increased salary there is no other source than the supplement which you by your votes today shall supply. Your responsibility, therefore, to provide for the education of the children is grave at the present juncture for our only hope for the future with all its uncertainties lies in the education of the children of today.

It is unfortunate that in many districts a large number of the ratepayers who have no children of school age regard the education of children of other people as no responsibility of theirs and who consider that it is in their interest to keep down school expenditures.

Surely it must concern those who hold this opinion, whether they shall allow the school to go down and so expose their families and the reputation of their community to the corrupting influence of illiteracy and immorality in the young people growing up in the district.

A year ago the following amendment was made to the School Act: "Section 46 of the Public Schools Act is amended by adding thereto the following:—Notwithstanding anything in this Act or Amendments thereto, every married woman or widow having one or more children of school age in actual attendance at the school, shall be a qualified voter at all school meetings and shall be eligible for election as school trustee." It is hoped that the influence of these mothers will make for improvement in your school and the immediate improvement to be made is to provide salaries that will induce capable teachers to remain in the profession. I regard our educational outlook as serious and deem it my duty to place my views frankly before you, so that you may act at this meeting whilst it is most convenient for you to do so. It is within your means for the maintenance of your school.

Trusting that the seriousness of the situation shall make it appeal to all at this meeting.

in committee; and it was arranged that both by-laws should be read a third time at a meeting which was held yesterday morning.

On motion of Councillor Yeo the calling of tenders for the making of several uniforms for the policemen was ordered.

It was also ordered that tenders be called for the delivery of 175 tons of coal for civic purposes, to be weighed on the City scales.

Councillor Yeo moved, seconded by Councillor Webster, that the by-law respecting the inspection of meat, poultry, fish, and other food products be read a second time. Councillor Rattray and others took exception to further action until the opinion of the Recorder as to the power of the Council to enforce such a by-law had been obtained in writing.

The by-law reads as follows:
Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:

1. There shall be appointed by the City Council a competent Officer, hereafter called the "Inspector," whose duty shall be to inspect all meats, poultry, fish and other food products offered for sale in the said City or brought to the City for sale.

2. No person shall keep, or have in his possession, for sale, offer for sale, or sell or barter any meats or poultry in the said City without first

(a) paying in respect thereof the following tolls or license that is to say; for every carcass or portion of a carcass of beef—cents; for every carcass, or portion of a carcass, of mutton or lamb—cents; for every carcass, or portion of a carcass, of pork—cents; for every turkey—cents; for every goose—cents; and for every duck or chicken—cents.

(8) having all said meat or poultry examined and approved by the Inspector, and obtaining the Inspector's Certificate of such approval.

3. In all cases the organs must accompany the article of meat to be inspected, before the Inspector approves thereof.

4. The foregoing tolls or license fees are in addition to any rents, licenses or charges now collectable from meat and poultry vendors and shall be paid to the Market Clerk or to the Inspector who shall pay and account for the same to the City.

5. No inspector shall pass or approve of, and no person shall keep or offer for sale or sell or barter within the City any meat or poultry that is in any way tuberculous diseased, tainted, unwholesome or unclean, or so as for any reason whatever to be poultry may be seized, and destroyed unfit for use. And any such meat or by the Inspector or Market Clerk of the City or by any Police Officer, and the owner thereof shall have no compensation therefore against the City in any of the said offices.

6. All persons selling meat or poultry, whether in shops, market, stalls or market square, shall keep the meat and poultry, receptacles, furnishings and surroundings clean and sanitary, and the premises shall at all times be available for inspection.

7. Slaughter houses within the City shall be kept and conducted in a clean and sanitary manner and shall at all times be subject to the inspection of the Inspector.

8. Any person who fails to observe or offends against any of the provisions of this Act shall be liable upon summary conviction, before the Stipendiary Magistrate, of the City, to a penalty, not exceeding the sum of dollars and Cents for each offense; and on non-payment thereof it shall and may be lawful for the said Stipendiary Magistrate to commit the offender or offenders to the common jail of the City of Charlottetown, for any period not exceeding thirty days, unless the said penalty be sooner paid.

On the suggestion of Councillor Riley the matter was postponed to a special meeting of Council to be held on Thursday evening next. Council adjourned.

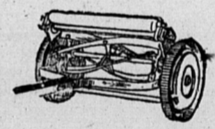

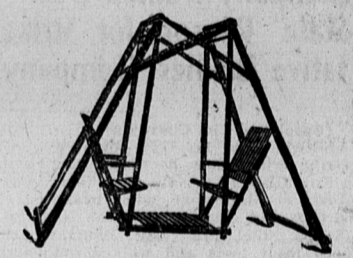

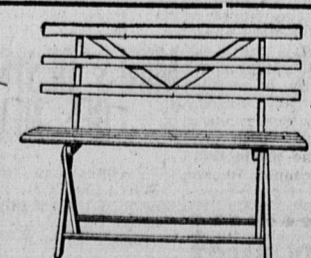
