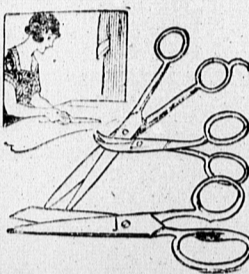

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### Sweepstake Probe Asked By Lafleche

#### LEGION PRESIDENT APPEALS TO TASCHEREAU TO CONDUCT INVESTIGATION IN QUEBEC

OTTAWA, November 26—Premier L. A. Taschereau of Quebec, in his capacity of Attorney-General, has been appealed to by Col. L. A. LaFleche, Dominion president of the Canadian Legion, to investigate the supposed conducting of a sweepstake in that province by an organization referred to in press despatches as "the Canadian Legion." Leo Plaisance, a Montreal bell boy, was credited with winning \$50,000 in a sweepstake on the Manchester Handicap. Col. LaFleche said tonight it was contrary to the policy of the Legion, as enunciated at Regina in 1929, to permit either the Dominion body or any local or provincial command, to conduct lotteries or sweepstakes. He had asked Col. P. F. Clarke, president of the Quebec Command of the Legion, also to investigate the matter, the Dominion president said.

In a telegram to Premier Taschereau, Col. LaFleche called upon him to see that those responsible for this forbidden and supposedly illegal enterprise are brought to task forthwith and that effective measures are taken in your province to prevent repetition as long as laws remain as at present.

Col. LaFleche said tonight if it were discovered that any local or provincial command had conducted a lottery, it would be reprimanded by the Dominion organization for a breach of policy. He believed, however, that some persons or an organization had used the Legion's name in operating the sweepstakes and in that case, he called upon the province to conduct the investigation.

"The Legion," the president said, "cannot conduct unlawful practices and maintain its present close relations with Parliament and the general public."

### New C. A. H. A. Hockey Rules

The new rules of the C. A. H. A. which come into force in the Maritime Provinces, as well as elsewhere in Canada, this season, are: "A goal cannot be scored off the skate or any part of the body of an attacking player," was an addition to clause 8. The offside rule had added to it: "Player must be behind or even with the players last playing the puck or in possession of same before it crosses the 60 foot line. If not, and the puck has gone out of the 60 foot area before he touches it, he has committed an offside and play must be stopped and puck faced off on the 60 foot line."

### 20 U. S. Customs Officers Held

#### ARRESTED AT DETROIT ON CHARGES OF ACCEPTING LIQUOR BRIBES

DETROIT, Nov. 26—Twenty or more United States customs officers were arrested here today on charges of accepting bribes to allow passage of liquor boats across the Detroit river, according to an article to be published by The Detroit Free Press tomorrow.

Arrests were made by special Treasury Department agents working out of Washington, the article says. Warrants will be served, it adds, unless "satisfactory explanations can be offered by the officers of certain actions."

Collector of Customs H. L. Pickert, the only federal official here who would comment, admitted that "several men were being held."

### Will Stop Smoking

P. L. Clancy, lessee of the Halifax Forum, states that smoking would be strictly prohibited in the Forum during games there this winter.

"Tickets will be sold to patrons with this understanding," said Mr. Clancy, "and any violation of the rule will result in the ejection from the building of the responsible party. A number of special police officers ('Red Caps') will enforce the new regulation."

#### ANNUAL SALE OF TUBERCULOSIS SEALS

Dr. W. J. McMillan is Chairman of the Provincial Tuberculosis Seal Sale Committee which at a meeting held yesterday afternoon, decided to launch the annual sale of seals during the first week in December. As in the past few years the seals will be delivered by mail to some 3,000 residents of the province and the Committee is again confident of the same generous purchase of seals as has characterized previous sales.

"This year," said Dr. McMillan, "the seal shows a jolly Santa Claus carrying a small Christmas tree over his shoulder and raising his hand in cheery greeting. In a corner is the double-barred cross in red which is the international symbol of the fight against tuberculosis. Appearing on the seal each year, regardless of changes in design, this double-barred cross serves to identify the seals to the public as authentic tuberculosis seals. It is a guarantee that money spent in their purchase supports the organized fight against this terrible disease. The seal also carries the message, 'Merry Christmas—Health to All.'"

The Chairman said that it had been brought to the attention of the Committee that children in Charlottetown have been selling Christmas seals from house to house in aid of the Red Cross and that the Society wishes the public to know that no children in the City of Charlottetown have been authorized to do this.

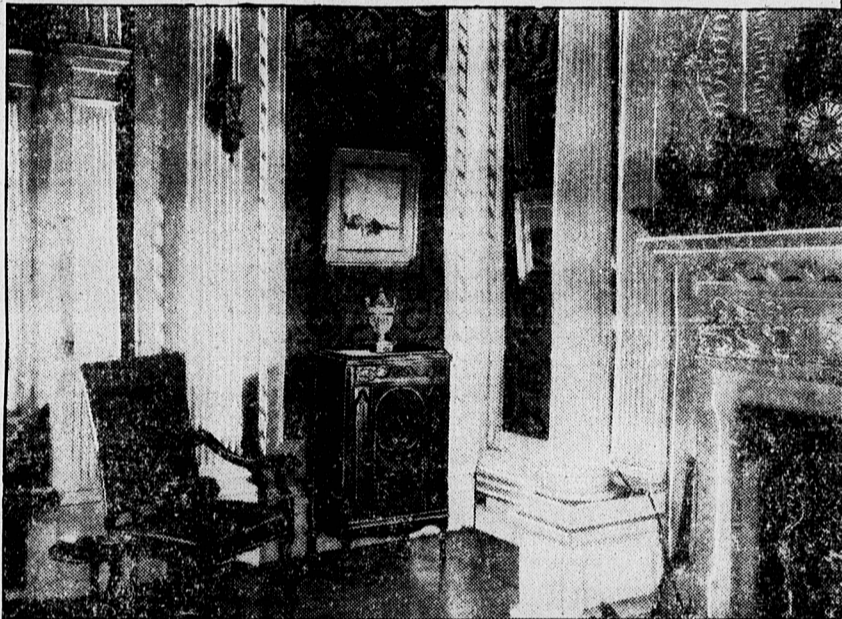
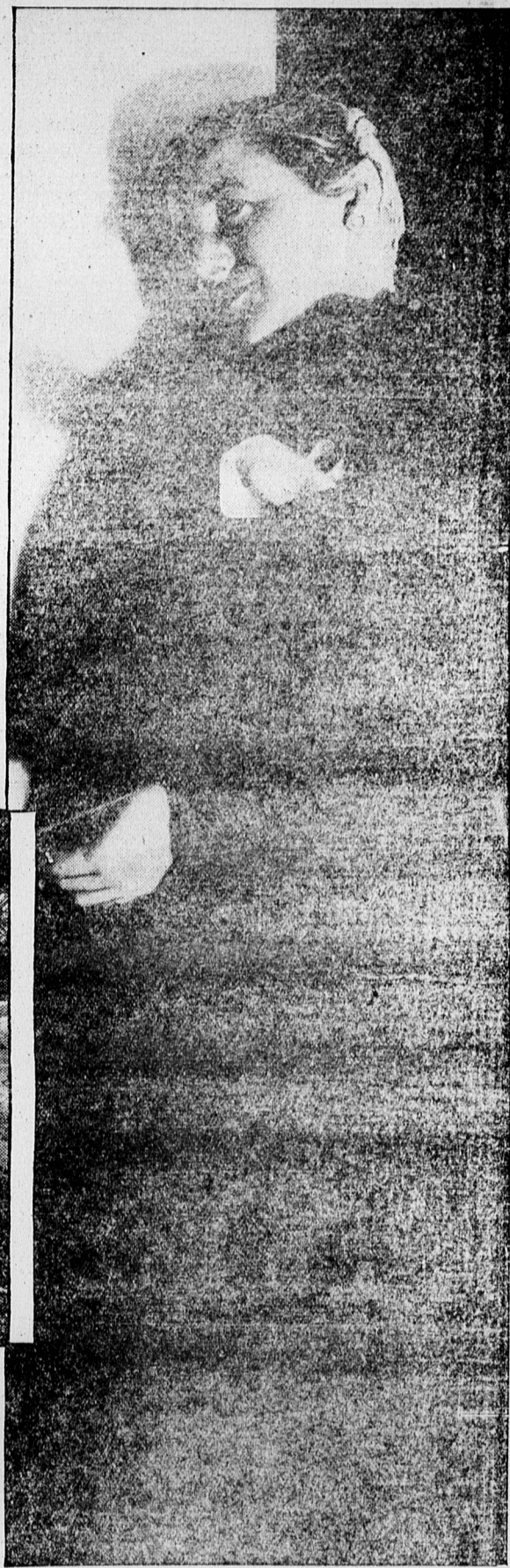

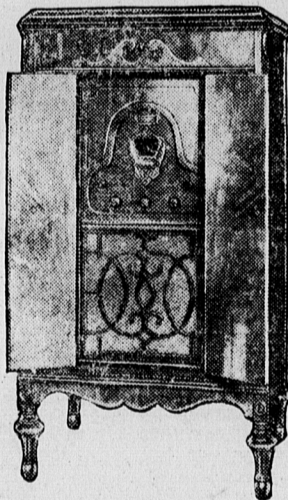
