In the bivouac of life there is no spot on earth so fair that death shall not fling its pall and in the fight with death men must give in at last. On Saturday the angel of death relieved Mr. Sydney B. Enman of earthly cares, and his spirit winged its flight through the eternal portals where toils shall cease and rest begin. It will be remembered by the majority of our readers that he came to Charlottetown about 18 years ago and entered the employ of Messrs. J. D. McLeod & Co. Later on he accepted a position with Messrs. Beer & Goff. It was perhaps at the latter place he became best known and friendships kindled between the employee and customer which continued until the present. Some five years ago his health was not what it ought to be and upon the recommendation of his physician he removed with Mrs. Enman and child to Colorado Springs where his impaired constitution was greatly improved. He afterwards removed to Nelson, B. C. where by his renewed strength he succeeded in building up an excellent business. The improvement was only temporary, however, and under the strain of business life his constitution again weakened and feeling that the end must soon come he resolved to return to the capital of his native province and there to spend his last hours. Ten days after reaching the shores of this province the flickering light of life went out and his soul was taken to be with the One who gave it—giving expression of his implicit trust in the Master whom he delighted to serve, just previous to entering the valley and the shadow of death. Besides a grief stricken wife a little girl is left to mourn the loss of an affectionate father. Two sisters and one brother also remain. The sisters are Mrs. James McGougan of Malpeque and Mrs. George Roberts of Boston. The funeral cortege yesterday afternoon was very large. Revs. G. M. Young, and J. W. McConnell conducted the services, the former saying the ritual for the dead of the Oddfellows, the deceased being a member of St. Lawrence Lodge. A number of the members of the First Methodist choir of which deceased was at one time a member were present and conducted the singing. The pall bearers were Messrs. F. Sellar, John McLean, W. R. Boraham, L. C. Worthy, James Stewart, R. F. Damarell. The floral tributes were very beautiful including three links from St. Lawrence Lodge, a crescent from the Rebekah's, a crescent from Mr. and Mrs. John McLaren a crescent from Mrs. Fennel and Mrs. Wright, calla lilies from Mrs. Geo.
