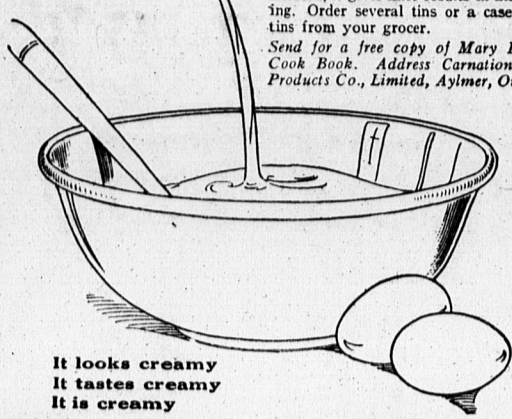

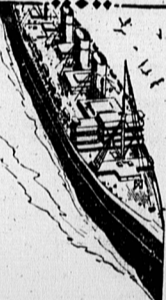

—A NARROW ESCAPE.—What might have been a fatal accident occurred while Mr. MacKenzie, Kinross, was driving his car between Kinross and Ugg. —MODERN CONVENIENCES. A great fault with farm life is the lack of conveniences in the home as running water, bath, toilet, etc. Mr. Frank McAulay, Souris Line Road has placed all these city conveniences in his home this summer. Running water both hot and cold, at the sink in the porch and washroom, also upstairs in the bath and lavatory. The system is a tank in the attic filled by a force pump in the porch, driven by a 1-1/2 horsepower gasoline engine which previously was and is yet used for driving the washing machine, cream separator, etc. The waste and sewerage pipes are extended several hundred feet to a swamp. Considerable of the work was done by Mr. McAulay himself, as he is a carriage-builder by trade though not working except for his own needs, and by Mr. Lavie, Plumber and Unsmith of Souris, only the women of the household can fully appreciate these conveniences.
