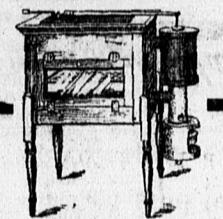

WHY THE TITLE?

"AN ATTIC SALT-SHAKER"

"ATTIC SALT," all good dictionaries tell us, is "a poignant delicate wit peculiar to the Athenians." Now, almost everyone knows what a "shaker" is. Add "shaker" to "Attic Salt," oscillate well, serve with Sunday breakfast, and, well—there you are!

BEFORE dealing with the broader aspects of the title, and mainly for educational purposes, I should explain that the word "Attic"—again, according to all good dictionaries—is, "a low story," etc. But that is another story, having to do with the place where all great writers live. "Attic" was introduced into architecture from the idea that the feature to which it alluded was constructed in the Athenian manner at the time of Atticus.

WHO was Atticus? He was a Roman philosopher and scholar distinguished for his fine literary taste and excelling in the composition of epigrammatic inscriptions. He was, in short, the wittiest man of his days,

which were 109-32; B. C. You get our connection. WHAT has that to do with Athenians? you may reasonably ask. Well, during the Civil War between Sulla and Marcus, Atticus, evidently a draft-dodger, retired to Athens, where he remained for many years—presumably, until the little affair at home had blown over—and gained the favor of the Athenians, we are told, by his munificence and benevolence, proving that, even in those days, money "spoke."

TO SUM UP: Atticus (his friends, Caesar, Pompey, Brutus, Marc Anthony, et al., called him "Attic" for short) was a philosopher and scholar distinguished for his literary taste and excellence in the composition of epigrammatic inscriptions. He was the inventor of a "poignant, delicate wit peculiar to the Athenians." Whereas, "An Attic Salt-Shaker" is peculiar to none. It is the League of Nations idea applied to wit and humor.

GOOSE RAISING ON THE FARM. Goose raising is a very profitable side line to the farmer. Essentials to success in this line of poultry farming are proper selection of breed and breeding stock, and free range with an abundance of succulent green food. The breeds of geese recommended for the farmer are Toulouse, Embden or African. Experiments conducted at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, have proven that the Toulouse is the most desirable breed.

Select one male and two or three good strong females in the autumn and confine the small flock in a suitable house during the winter months. Have all other geese removed from the building if you are making up a new mating. Feed your geese moderately during the winter months on grain of good quality. About half of the food given during the time snow is on the ground should be green food such as clover or alfalfa hay which has been cut green, well cured and stored so as to preserve the leaves. Geese take very kindly to green food and it provides bulk to the ration and assists in keeping the birds from getting over fat during the winter.

A little extra feeding in early March will stimulate egg production. Laying should commence about March 15th providing the spring is beginning to open up. Gather the eggs regularly and keep them in a moderate temperature of about 50c.

When the goose becomes broody give her about ten eggs and put the balance under her. Moisten the eggs daily after the 14th day. The period of incubation is 31 days. During that time feed and water the broody birds regularly. Do not disturb the goose at hatching time.

Leave the young brood alone for about two days after hatching. In place a green sod near the nest to induce them to start feeding. Their own accord. Water should also be provided in a shallow pan. Give the goslings moist bread crumbs for the first few feedings and then start with moist mash. Equal parts cornmeal, barley meal, bran and shorts make an excellent mixture.

Feed the goslings about five times daily for the first month, then three times daily. Good succulent pasture should always be available if goose raising is to be made profitable.
