WHY PAY \$4. FOR \$1. BARREL APPLES?

Fruit Commissioner Says Remedy in Hands of Consumer—Get Together.

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.—The Western Ontario fruit grower is getting this year an average of 50 cents a barrel for his apples. The consumer is paying from \$3 to \$4 per barrel, and in the West from \$4 to \$5.

In order that the figure received by the producer, Mr. D. Johnson, fruit commissioner of the Department of Agriculture, suggests in a circular which he has issued that municipalities or groups of consumers should organize the purchase of apples.

Mr. Johnson states that apples could be placed in the cellars of the homes of our cities at \$1 per barrel if gone about in the proper way. The solution of the situation is in the hands of the consumers themselves.

DIPLMACY OF GERMANY (Continued from page two.)

Send back the German right and relieve Antwerp, whatever confidence we may entertain that the shock of the Russian masses in the east may soon prove decisive, we must not entertain the slightest illusion regarding the hard and trying conditions which await all the allies in their future operations against Germany reduced to the defensive. Germany is still united and her resources are great. All her men are in arms and all her arsenals are working at full pressure. Her unbeaten fleet and flotillas will strike when their hour comes, and probably in co-operation with her army.

The line of the Aisne, even when forced, may prove only one of many similar lines which are being prepared in rear of it, facing not only east, but also south, first on the Meuse in Belgium, and then from Aix la Chappelle to Cologne. In the east similarly well fortified lines will be found, covering immense fronts, and it may take long, very long, for the allies to compel Germany to experience the sense of her weakness.

It therefore devolves upon the allies to look forward to a long war and to take corresponding measures. We must all, day by day, and year by year, increase the number and the machinery of our field armies, and gradually exhaust the enemy by fighting him on both fronts without haste but without rest. Positions must be prepared so that we can fall back on them in the event of temporary reverses, and a steady war of attrition must be waged against Germany's commerce, finance, credit and means of livelihood. The allies are not in a mood even to think of peace. Determined as they all are that such a war as this must never occur again, and persuaded as they are that it is a question of life or death for them all to succeed, they are one and all prepared to fight to the end to destroy a military despotism which has shown itself to be incompatible with the tolerable existence of nations and the peace of the world.

KITCHENER'S VISITS A TONIC FOR WOUNDED. LONDON, Oct. 24.—Lord Kitchener, of course, still holds his fascination for the people, and many admirers await his coming every day around the War Office. Their patience, however, is rarely rewarded, for the policemen on guard profess stolid ignorance of his whereabouts to endless enquiries, and more than once a big green Rolls Royce car has driven up and the War Minister alighted and quickly entered the building without being recognized by the very people who were asking eager questions about him. Two or three times, however, greater luck has attended them, when Lord Kitchener has visited the King, visited the headquarters headquarters staff uniform, which immediately arrests attention. On one afternoon his stay at the Palace lasted nearly two hours, and as the news of his presence there had got hinted abroad, a crowd of some hundreds had collected and cheered him warmly as he drove out and up Constitution Hill, when it was noticed that a special gold and blue label on the bonnet acted as a warning to the police to hold up the traffic for him to pass.

GREETINGS ALL KINDLY. So much for Lord Kitchener's public appearances; but another side of the picture is seen by the privileged few who have been present in the hospitals, both public and private, to which he has paid visits; for then he comes out in a new light, and those who know him only by stories of drastic discipline and tireless work, which whether authentic or not, at all the same tale, would find a curious contrast in the cherry kindness with which he greets men and officers alike, having apparently something of interest to tell each of the latter of his corps or his friends, apparently with ample time to chat, never asking the usual wearisome questions, the answers to which he seems to know better than those who have just come from the trenches, and leaving renewed vigor and optimism behind him. Indeed, the leading surgeon of one of the hospitals was heard to exclaim that "he wished Kitchener would leave the War Office for the wards," so admirable a tonic did his visits prove.

NEGRO MAID TOLD DRAMATIC STORY AT CARMAN TRIAL

MINEOLA, New York, Oct. 24.—Celia Coleman, negro maid in the Carman household, and star witness for the State, testified at the trial of Mrs. Florence Conklin Carman, accused of the murder of Mrs. Louise Bailey, that Mrs. Carman had appeared to her, revolver in hand, a moment after Mrs. Bailey had been shot, and that Mrs. Carman had said: "I shot him." Celia thought Mrs. Carman referred to her husband, Dr. Carman. "The next morning about daylight Mrs. Carman came to my room," Celia continued. "She said, 'Oh, Celia, what did I kill that woman for? I hope God will forgive me. You stick to me and if anything happens to you I'll take care of your little boy.'"

The witness continued: "The day after the murder Mrs. Carman came into the kitchen and asked me to make a wooden fire in the stove, which I did. Later she came downstairs with a bundle of letters and burned them up in the fire. That same day she told me to call her father from the barn because she wanted him to get the revolver out of the house. Mr. Conklin, her father, came in and went to her room and then came down stairs again. He had a hammer with him. He returned to the barn. The next day, Wednesday, Mrs. Carman came into the kitchen and asked me to step into the office. I went in and the detectives began to question me."

"Did you tell the truth at the coroner's inquest?" the district attorney asked. "I did not," the witness answered.

Celia Coleman testified on cross examination that when she was being brought from Freeport to Mineola to go before the Grand Jury, Dr. Carman told her not to change her testimony and that he "would take care of her."

Mrs. Carman, she continued, gave her an extra \$5 a few days after the murder. "That is for keeping your mouth shut," the witness said. Mrs. Carman told her for an hour and a half Mr. Graham alternately shouted at Celia and pleaded with her, seeking to make her vary her story.

The defendant appeared to be more nervous than she was yesterday. She smiled at her counsel and a woman friend among the spectators, and sank wearily into a chair, apparently the strain was telling.

BRITISH CAPTAIN MAY FACE TREASON

Steamer Lowther Range's Commander is Accused of Supplying Enemy with Coal.

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—The Naval Service Department has been officially notified of the bringing into Esquimaut harbor of the British steamer Lowther Range, as a prize of war by the cruiser Rainbow. The prize court will be held at Victoria in due course.

As it is a British ship that was suspected of selling coal to German warships in the Pacific, there will be not only the question of the confiscation of ship and cargo, but if the evidence is sufficient there is likely to be a charge of high treason against the captain for thus actively aiding the King's enemies.

The Lowther Range took on a cargo of coal at Rockhampton, N. S., and sailed around the Atlantic and through the Straits of Magellan, ostensibly bound for Australia. She was found, however, by a British cruiser off the Gulf of California. The captain was not able to explain sufficiently why he came there, or why the draft of the vessel was much lighter than given in her papers. A prize crew was put in charge of the steamer, which was taken northward and handed over to the Rainbow to be taken to Esquimaut.

WANT CANADA TO SEND NAVAL FORCE

Drawn From Coast and Lake Towns To Help Man New British Ships.

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.—The sending of a contingent of a thousand or two thousand naval volunteers in addition to the military forces is the suggestion which has been made to the Government from Vancouver. There is now two hundred men at the coast in addition to those serving on the Rainbow.

They want this increased to a thousand men, and suggest that a contingent be raised on the Pacific and Atlantic coast and the Great Lakes of fishermen, yachtsmen and men used to the water to accompany the next expeditionary army. They would have to complete their training in England, but it is pointed out that a force of this character would be as valuable as the military expedition, as men are needed for the new ships which Great Britain is building and to supply wastage.

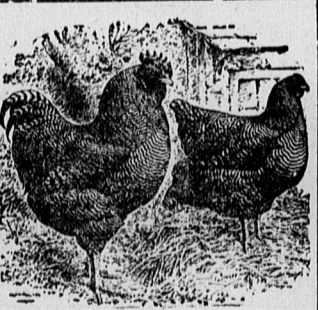
