

Add on Marble

Cook's Corner

DAMSON PLUM CONSERVE

4 pounds Damson plums
2 medium oranges
3 pounds sugar
1 pound raisins
1 cup chopped nuts

DIRECTION: Wash the plums, stem, remove the pits and chop the fruit into small pieces. Peel both oranges and slice the rind of one orange quite finely, discarding the rind of the other orange. Chop the pulp of both oranges and remove ribs.

Combine the chopped plums, sliced peel and orange pulp with the raisins and sugar. Heat the mixture slowly to the boiling point, stirring to dissolve the sugar, then boil quite rapidly until the fruit is clear and the mixture has thickened. Just before removing from the fire, add the chopped nuts, stirring until these are well blended into the mixture.

Pour into hot, sterilized jars and seal with melted paraffin. Cover the jars and store in a cool, dry place.

A. No; this is overdue and is now considered a mark of ill-breeding.


How Can I!!!
