**A BIRD DOCTOR.**

Buffalo Girl Cures Sick and Injured of the Feathered Tribe.

With no medical degree with no connection with any hospital, college or institution of any kind, Miss Virginia Pope, of Buffalo, is nevertheless the best loved, and in her particular department, the most famous physician in the country.

Pet birds form the entire clientele of this remarkable specialist.

So far as known there is no ailment from which a bird can suffer, from a robin's nervous prostration to bronchitis in a nightingale, which Miss Pope is not fully equipped to cope with.

If the canary declines food and mopes in its cage, Miss Pope is called in. One professional glance tells her whether the canary has indigestion or a broken heart and she treats it accordingly.

It is critical cases, however, that Miss Pope has gained her fame. Actual physical injuries, such as wounds and broken limbs, resulting in fevers and other complications, which are ordinary, when birds are the patients, dismissed as hopeless cases, she is an adept at curing. Her speciality is surgery and it is in the repairing of broken bones that Miss Pope has built this basis of her most unusual reputation.

Bird doctoring was not, in Miss Pope's case, deliberately chosen as a career. With a great fondness for birds, but with only an amateurish knowledge of anatomy and medicine, she once undertook to treat one of her own pets. She succeeded so well that she then constituted herself the regular physician of the five or six feathered creatures that she happened to own.

Between times her enthusiasm led her to make a special study of bird structure and of bird diseases, a knowledge which her friends were not slow in calling into requisition.

In a year or two all Buffalo knew that Miss Pope could mend a canary's broken ankle as easily as a regular surgeon could minister to man. In this way her pursuit developed into a profession, and in the past few years her success has become a matter of national interest.

As she is known and in demand from the great lakes to the gulf and from New York to San Francisco she spends a good share of her time in travelling.—New York World.

**PARROTS FIND TROUBLE**

Birds Have A Fight With Some Monkeys.

CHICAGO, July 31.—Cries of "Help," "Police" and "Let go" attracted the attention of Policeman Edward Murphy to the bird store of Nathan Slotkin, No. 217 Madison street.

Peering in the front window the policeman saw two parrots fighting half a dozen monkeys. The monkey cage was filled with feathers and the two parrots were lying on their backs shrieking for aid.

Murphy notified the Pinkerton patrol, as the bird store is watched by that service, and Lieut. Cameron hurried to the rescue. Cameron entered the store and the monkeys saw him they began to chatter wildly, and showed fight when he thrust a cane through the bars of the cage. "Let go" and "Take him off" while Cameron beat the chimpanzees with the stick.

After a fierce battle of five minutes Cameron succeeded in drawing the wounded parrots to the side of the cage, and then, reaching in the door, rescued them from the monkeys. Both birds were badly used up, and it is thought they cannot live. Their legs and wings are broken and their breasts are also crushed.

Mr. Slotkin, the proprietor of the store, was sent for and upon his arrival the wounded birds raised their heads to say:—

"Well, we went looking for trouble and we got it."

How the parrots escaped from their cage Mr. Slotkin does not know, but he thinks they opened the door, as it was securely locked when he left the store at four o'clock Sunday afternoon.

There were four parrots in the cage, but only two of them got into trouble with the monkeys. These two straggled down from the middle of the store to the monkey cage that occupies the entire front window. They probably called the monkeys names, and the latter reached out between the bars and dragged them in.

When Murphy's attention was first attracted by the cries he thought some one was being murdered in the store. He was fifty feet away when he heard the call of "Police," and upon reaching the window he saw the struggle in the monkey cage.

**SUICIDE VISITED HALIFAX.**

BUFFALO, August 1.—Last night a man registered as Jack W. Grant, of New Glasgow, Va., committed suicide by shooting himself. From letters found in Grant's pockets it is evident that the man left San Francisco on July 25 and intended visiting Boston and Halifax.

**THE POPE BIG MAIL.**

LONDON, July 30.—A Berlin newspaper publishes some curious details respecting the letter bags of the principal European sovereigns. The Pope holds the first place, as he receives every day from 22,000 to 23,000 letters and newspapers. King Edward VII. comes next, with 3,000 newspapers (and 1,000 letters). The Czar and the German Emperor receive each from 600 to 700 letters, appeals, etc.; the King of Italy, 500; Queen Wilhelmina, from 100 to 150.

**COMMITTED SUICIDE.**

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Aug. 1.—H. C. Sheffield, until recently sleeping car distributor for the Canadian Pacific Railway Company in Ontario, committed suicide at the Windsor hotel here yesterday by shooting himself through the head. Despondency over loss of position and financial troubles was the supposed cause. He leaves a wife and two daughters.

**BIG WAGES FOR LABORERS.**

OTTAWA, July 31.—The services of the immigration branch of the interior department have been called upon to assist in getting laborers for the Manitoba harvest. Frank Pedley, superintendent of immigration, has cabled to W. T. R. Preston, Inspector of European agencies, directing him to have it made known that 20,000 laborers are required to harvest the crops in western Canada. The wages offered are \$2.25 to \$2.50 per day, and employment for three months is guaranteed.
