CHEMISTRY HELPS TO WIN THE WAR



THE FARMER

"Keeps 'em Fighting"

The Canadian farmer has one of the biggest jobs of this war on his hands: to feed his fellow-citizens and to export the vast quantities of food required by our overseas forces.

In every way, the job is larger than in the last war. More countries have been overrun by the enemy, many cargoes are being lost at sea.

Demands on the farmer for increased production must be passed on by him to Canadian soil. Each acre must produce better crops. Among the contributions reported by the Special Names Committee was an anonymous donation of \$500. And so it went. As the figures piled up, enthusiasm increased, and there was cheering as well as applause when the totals were announced.

Ch'Town Goes Over The Top In Red Cross Drive

First Day's Drive Nets \$25,000. Enthusiastic Meeting Last Night.

Total receipts from Charlottetown drive to last night in the Red Cross drive were \$25,000—seven thousand dollars more than the objective set for the City after only one day's canvassing and with one-third of the subscription cards still out.

The chairman announced that word was received of a very active campaign in Summerside, which has already raised \$6,000 in cash.

This was the inspiring news announced at last night's largely attended meeting of Charlottetown canvassers, held in the Baptist Church school room.

Enthusiastic applause greeted the announcement of the returns. As each divisional commander and team captain reported, the results were scored up in large figures on the platform by Mr. Wallace Scantlebury.

Mr. George Tweedy reported collections of \$18,863, by the special names committee—the largest on record for any campaign in the city.

Mr. J. A. MacMillan, chairman of the Ladies' Division, reported collections of \$340.50.

Mr. J. M. Murley, for the non-resident division, reported collections of \$810.
