

The fine quality of the children's training in song and speech was clearly attested by the keen appreciation of the audience many of whom were willing to accept standing room in order to witness the program.

Mr. P. L. Morris, chairman of the Trustees, presided, and announced the winners of prizes which were presented by Reverend Francis McQuaid. After the final chorus the graduates took their places on the stage forming a picturesque scene of thirteen young ladies in floor length gowns of pastel shades and four young men in their dark suits, with carnation boutonnières presented by Mrs. F. E. Sullivan. Then appeared two little tots, Geraldine McCarville and George McMahon, bearing a magnificent basket of flowers, the gift of Mrs. James Callaghan, to the graduates.

The Valedictorian, chosen by his classmates, was George Keefe, who was also leader of his class and winner of the Governor General's Bronze Medal, awarded for leading the 1946 Entrance Class. He delivered the Valedictory in a very capable and pleasing manner stressing the importance of their loyalty to the Class Motto "Semper Fidelis."

After explaining the real meaning of education Dr. Callaghan emphasized the value of a High School training for all and especially for those destined to take an important part in building up and keeping up our rural communities, since this aspect of the necessity of education is often overlooked. He also urged the students to continue to build upright and sturdy characters which would prove to be to them the foundation of success. He congratulated the people on the reputation already achieved by their school and expressed his hope that it would continue to advance with improved facilities.

The Pastor, Reverend Francis McQuaid, spoke briefly in congratulations to the students and Sisters on the success they had achieved in their academic work and also in the training in the fine arts as shown by the excellent program.

Other speakers included Reverend Eugene Murray who spoke in behalf of the clergy present. Hon. Horace Wright, M. L. A. and Mr. Heath Strong, M. L. A., all of whom expressed their pleasure to be present, their appreciation of the program, and their interest in the success of the School. The Trustees also spoke briefly and moved a vote of thanks to Rev. Dr. Callaghan, Rev. Francis McQuaid, the Sisters and all who contributed to make the occasion a success.
