National Health Service Begins in Britain July 5

By JAMES MCCOOK LONDON, June 20 - (CP) - A national health service designed to provide free medical care for every United Kingdom resident and expected to cost £150,000,000 (\$600,000,000) in the next nine months, comes into operation July 5.

The service comes into operation after a furious fight between Health Minister Bevan and the doctors' British Medical Association which argued nationalisation of health services as planned would make them civil servants. After concessions were made by the Minister, the B.M.A. agreed to recommend the profession should join the service. A doctor can choose between a £300 annual fixed payment by the state plus capitation fees or payment entirely on the basis of capitation fees.

Developments In The Orient (By James D. White, Associated Press News Analyst) History shifted into a higher gear in the Orient last week. Country by country, in a single week, this was Eastern Asia.

India—Negotiations for India to absorb the rich and important state of Hyderabad broke down. The dispute with Pakistan over Kashmir already has been carried to the United Nations. Burma—Premier Thakin Nu said his socialist state will 'follow Russia.' Malaya—A state of emergency, virtually martial law was declared throughout the Malay Federation to deal with widespread terrorism, allegedly Communist-inspired.

Siam—The Bangkok government raided Chinese secret societies, some of them Communist. There has been border trouble with Chinese Communists from Malaya. Indonesia—The Dutch unilaterally suspended United Nations sponsored talks with the dissident Indonesian republic after inviting the Indonesians to a meeting and then failing to show up themselves. Philippines—No truce yet with the Communist-influenced Hukbaha insurgents. The Philippines Congress gave priority to a proposed law on import controls, which United States business interests oppose. The government voted to give employees back pay for the three years of Japanese occupation, thus embarrassing United States firms which had not done this.

Hong Kong—Chinese merchant were wrathful over "the American policy of promoting Japanese industrial resurgence." China—The Chinese Government, with its currency down to 2,300,000 to one United States dollar on the Shanghai black market, sought a strategist to save the vital Yangtze Valley from the Communists. Korea—Dissidents in the United States-occupied south were reported planning mass demonstrations for independence, unity with the now Russian-occupied north, and an end to the American occupation. Japan—Least bothered by Communism in all Asia, Japan cannot recover until her business does, and that involves rebuilding her foreign trade which her recent victims in Asia oppose except on their own terms.

CANADIAN PURCHASES MAJOR BRITISH TASK LONDON, June 19 - (CP) - Dr. Edith Summerskill, food ministry parliamentary secretary, said in the Commons steps being taken to overcome the dollar problem and facilitate purchases from Canada "constitutes one of His Majesty's government's major tasks." She was answering J. F. Platts-Mills Labor member of parliament for Pinner, recently ejected from the party for leftist leanings. He asked if the good ministry was aware that apple growers in British Columbia are faced with a serious threat to their livelihood owing to the absence of arrangements to pay for such exports. He questioned what steps were being taken by the food ministry to overcome the dollar problem and "so preserve this essential source of supply for this country." "It is unfortunately true that our dollar resources may not be sufficient to enable Canada to sell to us all that she would wish or all that we would like to buy," said Dr. Summerskill. PILOT MISSES FIRE DAD ARRIVES FIRST PORT ARTHUR, June 19 - (CP) - When forestry pilot Jack Donnelly flew to Graham Lake to check a report of a bush fire in the area along the Canadian Pacific Railway's right-of-way, he could find no trace of smoke. He concluded it was a false alarm. It wasn't until later that he

learned the fire had been extinguished by the crew and passengers of a C. P. R. train on which his father, J. J. Donnelly, was conductor. Donnelly had been flying men and equipment to a stubborn bush fire at Windogokan Lake near the Quetico Park border when he received a radio message advising him to go to Graham Lake to check a report of a fire near the C. P. R. line. The former R.C.A.F. pilot landed his firefighters and equipment at Windogokan Lake and turned northward in search of the reported smoke. He circled the area for half an hour before returning to base, to report disgustedly that it was a false alarm. He learned that night it was not a false alarm when Mr. Donnelly senior told him the full story. His train had been running northwest of Port Arthur, through Graham. There was another fire at milepost 77. The train crew observed the flaming bushland, stopped the train, rigged hose to the engine pump and, with the aid of passengers who battled the fire with ers who swarmed from the coaches water, old sacks and shovels. Russians Continue To Dismantle German Factories BERLIN, June 17 - (AP) - Official German-language newspapers of both the United States and British Military Governments charge that Russia is continuing to dismantle German factories in the Russian zone despite highly-publicized official statements that the program had ended. Workers thus left without jobs are being sent as forced labor to the uranium mines of Saxony or to Russia, the newspapers Neue Zeitung and Die Welt say. "The end result of such a policy (of dismantlement) can only be the complete de-industrialization of the Soviet zone," Die Welt continued. "The resultant lowering of living standards will create an economic desert." Both newspapers listed 10 Soviet-owned factories and three plants already socialized as recently scheduled for dismantling. They include a machine, typewriter, synthetic fuel, film, cable and motor works. The two papers which frequently have official Anglo-American information made available to them, gave this picture of factory-dismantling and working conditions in the Saxony mines of the Soviet zone.
