CALENDAR.—The Guardian has received a useful calendar from The Boiler Inspection and Insurance Co. of Canada, Toronto.

SHORT COURSE BEGINS TODAY.—Today the morning trains will be bringing to the City from all parts of the Country, farmers, farmers' sons and farmers' wives and daughters; in all over three hundred are coming to attend the Short Courses in Agricultural and in Household Science. Mr. T. A. Benson, Dominion Poultry Representative, gives the first work in the annex of the Agricultural Hall. At 11.00 o'clock he begins egg candling. At 11.30 all the students will assemble in the large hall of Prince of Wales College where Professor Ross will arrange the classes and outline the work. At 2.30 egg candling will again be continued and it is expected will be completed by 6.00 o'clock. At 7 o'clock all the students will again meet in Prince of Wales College where addresses will be delivered by the Premier, the Commissioner of Agriculture and Professor Ross. On Tuesday morning Dr. Standish of the College of Agriculture, Truro, will begin classes with light horses and Prof. Davison and Mr. J. Artemas Clarke will take up work with grain. In the evening addresses will be delivered by Mr. R. H. Campbell, Superintendent of Education and others. On Wednesday Mr. W. J. Reid will take up swine judging and will be assisted by Duncan Anderson, who is well known all over Canada as an institute worker. Professor Davison and Mr. Clarke will continue the grain judging. Throughout the week from 11 to 12 and from 1 to 2 Mr. F. T. Morrow, Dairy Inspector, will give classes in milk testing in the basement of the annex of the Agricultural Hall. About 15 students is all that can be accommodated in the milk testing work at one time, so that only those who are particularly anxious will be given this course.

On Saturday afternoon the students will be taken to Messrs Davis & Fraser's pork packing establishment where different types of carcasses will be had of learning good facts in connection with the marketing and of pork raising. On the whole the course promises to be a big success and everyone within reach should take advantage of attending as many classes as possible. In the household work Miss James, Supervisor of Womens' Institute will be assisted by Mrs. A. Ethel Dunbrack, of Fredericton, N. B. Mrs. Dunbrack was in the Province for a short time last spring organizing womens' Institutes. She also did the judging at the seed fairs and needs no introduction to the women of the province.
