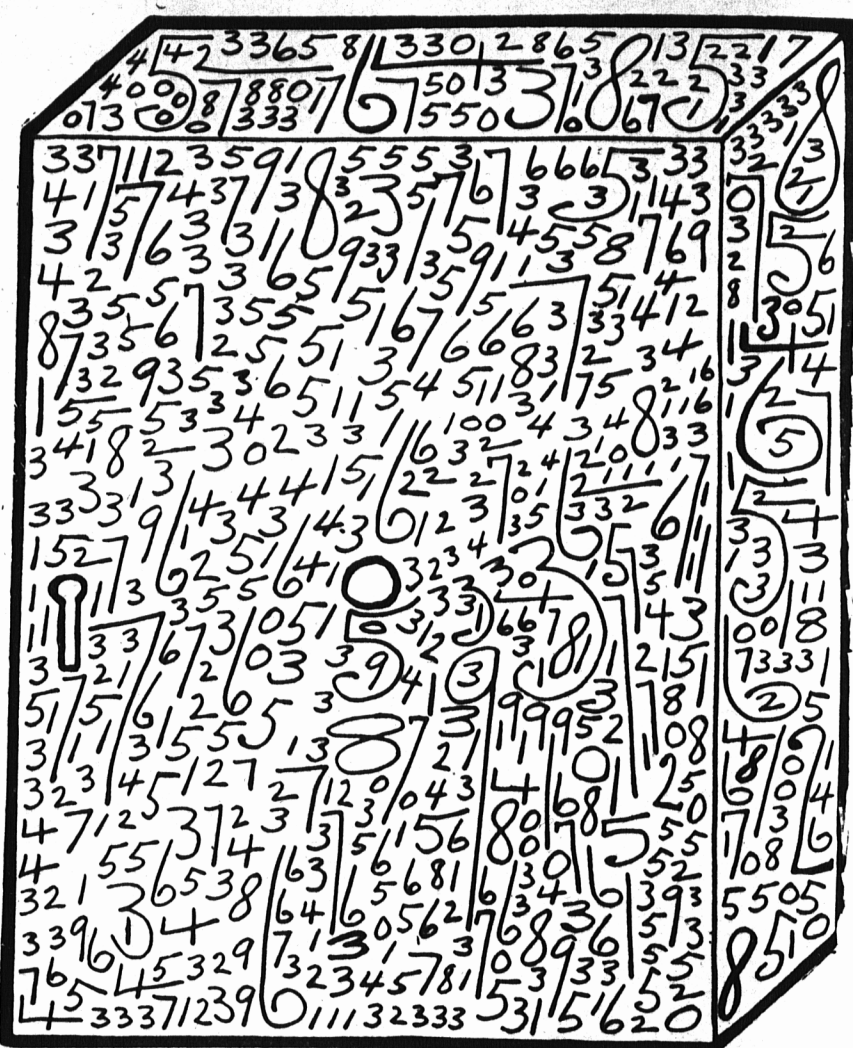

Plane With Rebel Leader Forced Down

SAN LUIS POTOSI, Mexico May 27. (AP) - Federal Government aviators today forced down an airplane carrying Rebel General Saturnino Cedillo, Cedillo whose peasant army has clashed with federal troops for a week, died with five followers. Troops quickly surrounded the site of the forced landing at Estancia above nine miles north-west of here. Cedillo and his followers had jumped from the plane and fled into the brush. Reports reached San Luis Potosi that the Rebel Chief had been captured, but they were not confirmed officially. In fleeing, Cedillo left behind five airplanes. Federal troops under General Lucas Gonzalez set out immediately to track the fugitives.
