**CHURCHES FOR TODAY YORK HAS REDUNDANT**

YORK, Eng. Aug. 18. (By the Canadian Press)—Some churches in York are considered redundant and proposals for their removal to the suburbs have been made by a Commission appointed by the Archbishop of York, Most Rev. Dr. William Temple, to "inquire into the resources and man-power, buildings and endowments of the Church in York and the way in which they can best be utilized."

The Commissioners say that the present state of affairs in the centre of York is, in their judgment, indefensible. The population is being reduced by the development of new housing areas in the suburbs, and the next 10 years will witness a further reduction of the small population within the city walls. Churches and clergy are already needed in the suburban areas with the population is moving. The Commissioners value highly the historical and architectural features of York's ancient churches, and where they have recommended a removal they are anxious that such features should be retained, either by the re-erection of the Church elsewhere, or by their preservation in other churches. At the same time the Commissioners' chief concern is the furtherance of the spiritual work of the Church where it is most needed.

The Commissioners recommend the amalgamation of several adjacent parishes with small parishes, which will save man power and give full time employment for the clergy ministering in city parishes. Opportunity should be taken in amalgamations to secure for every incumbent a stipend of \$2,250 with house, and provide endowment for curates in poorer parishes. The Commissioners recommend that St. John's Church, Micklegate, be removed, and, if possible, rebuilt elsewhere; that St. Mary's Bishop-hill, senior, be removed, and the graveyard converted into an open space; that St. Helen's Stonegate, or Holy Trinity, King's Square, should be used for a mortuary chapel, but, if this is not possible, then St. Helen's should continue to be used and Holy Trinity removed, except the tower, which, with its ancient bells should be carefully preserved; St. Saviour's should be removed and rebuilt in some new area, but if this is not practicable the church should remain where it is and be used; St. Michael's Spur-legate, should be removed, all features of historical interest being preserved in other churches and the site sold; St. Michael's Belfrey should be converted into a church hall, as it is not needed for parochial purposes.
