"I know how to look after myself," she added, explaining she learned judo when she lived in Winnipeg.

The killer's gun was believed to be a semi-automatic machine gun. It was missing from his car. His shots went wild but about 300 yards further on the bandit's

car swerved into the south ditch and the de Lierman car pulled up behind it. At this point eye-witness Robert Knobles, 16, working in a field opposite, said "the driver of the car fired through the rear window into the de Lierman car and jumped out, walked up to the car and fired more shots, killing both de Lierman and Goddyn." The witness said the man firing the shots then dashed into the nearby woods, leaving behind a revolver and an estimated \$23,000 in cash.

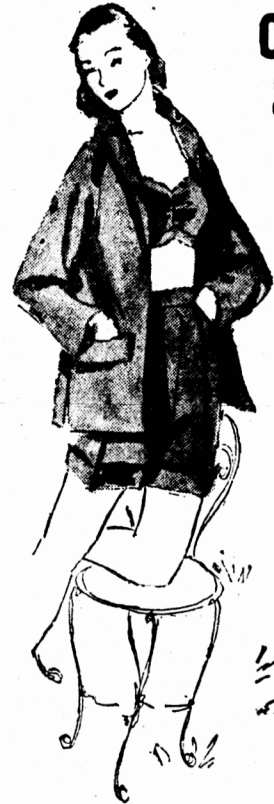
