

Board Names New Principal For City's Senior High School

The appointment of Col. L. F. MacDonald, B.A., B.Ed., as principal of the new senior high school for 1966-67 has been announced by Dr. R. G. Lea, chairman of the Board of School Trustees for Charlottetown.

At the same time Dr. Lea made it plain that there will be no tuition fees for students whose parents are tax-paying citizens in the City of Charlottetown.

Col. MacDonald, at present principal of Birchwood High School, has had a distinguished career, not only in education but in the military, community and provincial services. Holding university degrees from St. Dunstan's, he began his teaching career at Queen Square School in 1916. He saw active service with the Royal Flying Corps in World War I. He continued his teaching at Queen Square School between World War I and World War II. In the latter conflict he was again in active service, being demobilized in 1946 with the rank of Lt. Col. At present he is honorary colonel of No. 5 Signals Regiment.

He has been principal of Birchwood High since its opening in 1958.

Col. MacDonald has also given outstanding leadership in both professional and community affairs. He is past-president of the

City Teachers' Institute, P.E.I. Teachers' Federation and at present a member of the Canadian College of Teachers.

He is also past-president of P.E.I. Division of Red Cross, Charlottetown Kiwanis Club, and Maritime Hospital Association.

Dr. Lea has also announced that the Grade 10 and 11 program only will be offered in the Senior High School for 1966-1967, with Grade 12 to be added in September 1967. Arrangements have been made with Prince of Wales College, St. Dunstan's High School and Notre Dame Academy whereby City students will complete their Grade 12 in these institutions for the academic year 1966-1967.

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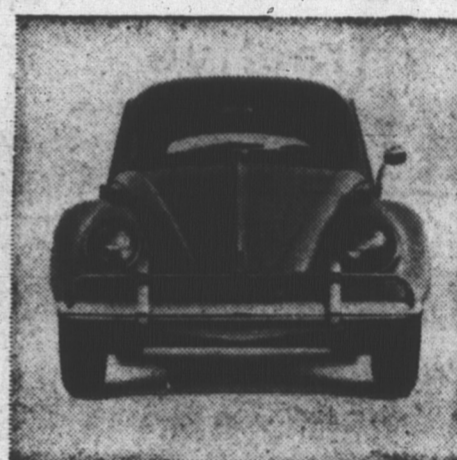
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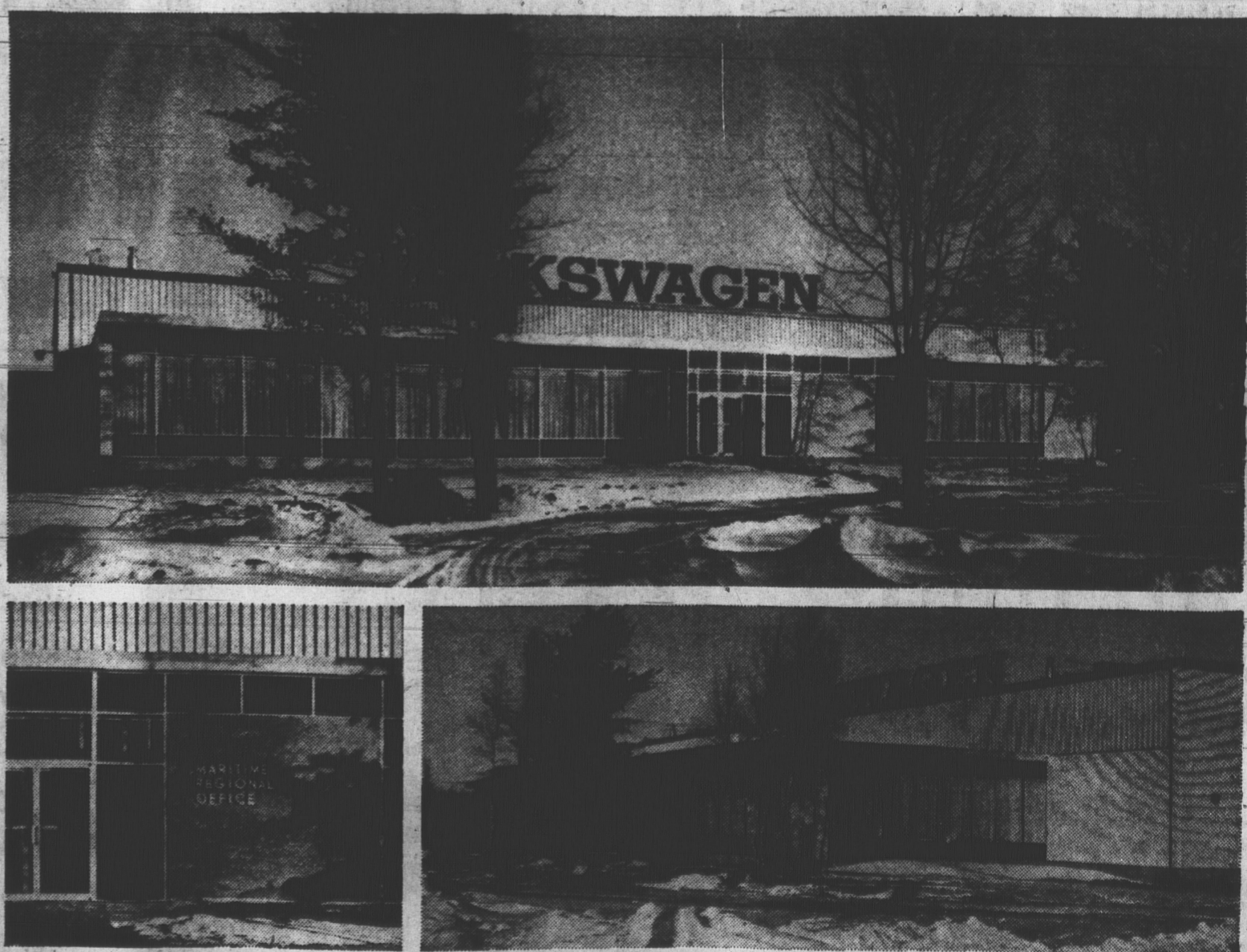
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
