OWING to the wet weather, there was a very small market to-day.

SIXTEEN hundred head of cattle have been fattened at J. P. Wiser's stables, Prescott, Ont., during the winter, and will be shipped to England.

THERE is a supplementary estimate of \$5,000 to be expended during the coming year for fish breeding establishments in this Province and Cape Breton.

19,784 tons of forward freight were landed at Halifax by the weekly steamers during the period between 12th December, 1877, and 22d April, 1878. Most of this went over the Intercolonial Railway.

THE barquentine Erema, McMahon, master, owned by Messrs. Peake Bro's & Co., sailed for Plymouth, G. B., to-day, with a cargo of 23,500 bushels of oats and 315 pieces of deal. This is the first produce shipment of the season for the English market.

WE are pleased to learn that at the meeting of the Marine Board, just concluded, John Nicholson and Samuel Buchanan passed as masters, and Philip Griffin as mate. They were all prepared at the Commercial College, and passed satisfactory examinations.

CIVIC ELECTIONS. - Writs for the election of a Councillor for Ward 4 have been issued. We learn that W. W. Stumbles, jun., Esq., has been asked to accept nomination as a candidate in the election which takes place on Monday next, the 13th inst., and that he has consented.

A CIRCULAR has been issued by the Customs Department, Ottawa, directing Collectors of Customs throughout the Dominion to enforce the law imposing a duty of 17 1/2 per cent. on all silver coin imported from the United States. This is in consequence of the remonetization of the silver bill having passed.

BUSINESS CHANGE. - The enterprising firm of Messrs. Geo. Davies & Co., has undergone a change - as will be seen on reference to our advertising columns. George Davies Esq., retires from the business, and it will, in future, be carried on, under the old name, by Messrs. T. J. Harris and W. H. Stewart - lately junior members of the firm.

WE learn that the Campbell-Wilson eloping party were captured at North Wiltshire. The enraged cousin of Miss Campbell kept in close pursuit since their departure, and found the proper trial on Monday night. At twelve o'clock he arrived at North Wiltshire station, and there found Miss Campbell quietly reposing on a lounge, watched over by a hospitable station master. Here he left her and pursued Wilson, whom he caught a short distance from the station, and after administering to him a violent castigation, returned to the station and compelled his deluded cousin to turn homewards.

THE hand-engine "Tremont," now located in the new Engine House, opposite the residence of Mr. Herbert Beer, was taken out for trial last evening. The "Tremont" has been tastefully painted by Messrs. McKinnon & Fraser, and made to look as good as new. The Chief Engineer of the Fire Department has had the valves packed, and the trial of the engine was satisfactory to the officers and men. But, while the engine appears to be in good working order, the hose provided by the Fire Department is of a very poor kind. The men were somewhat discouraged when length after length was shown to be so porous that streams of water issued freely from them in some places, and in other places the hose burst so badly that portions of it had to be laid aside. Good hose should be provided, so that in case of fire the officers and men may feel confident that they will be able to render effective service, and insure protection to property in the eastern section of the City.

R. Bourke, J. P., on conviction for assault; Peter Trainor vs. Nicholas Robinson - a like appeal from the same Court. Jas. Trainor vs. Nicholas Robinson, also a like appeal from the same Court. Thos. Murphy vs. the City of Charlottetown - an appeal from the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court on conviction for selling liquor without license. William Potter vs. the City of Charlottetown, a like appeal from the said Court. George Alley vs. the City of Charlottetown, an appeal from the judgment of the Stipendiary Magistrate on action for City taxes. Andrew McCoubrey vs. the City of Charlottetown, an appeal from the City Court on action of account. Robert Walsh vs. Thomas Doyle, an appeal on an action of account. James McDonald vs. J. R. Bourke, a similar appeal.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH. Special Despatch to Daily Examiner. LONDON, May 6. A Constantinople correspondent says: - "Another palace revolution is threatened. Conspirators favor the overthrow of the Sultan and the accession of Murad or somebody else. One day of last week was actually fixed for an attempt; but the fear of Russian interference caused them to change their plans, and the conspirators say they must wait until the Russians go."

ST. PETERSBURG, May 6. The Agency Russe has an article referring to statements in a St. Petersburg despatch to the London Times of April 29th, that among the concessions Russia should make are limitation of boundaries, the period of the occupation of Bulgaria, the substitution of an envoy for Russian Syndicate to consider claims of bondholders, as well as Russian claims of indemnity, and retrocession of but a small slip of Bessarabia, inhabited by Russians.

LONDON, May 6. A special from Pera to the Times says: "Advices from Adrianople and Philippopolis of the 2nd inst., report combined fighting about Haskoi, in which district twenty-one Mahomedan villages have been destroyed, the Russians laying the blame on the Bulgarians, who in turn lay it on the Russians."
