Freed Man Re-arrested On Leaving Law Courts

Following legal argument in court yesterday, an accused was declared free to go by the magistrate, only to be arrested or re-arrested as he left the Law Courts building.

William Dennis Pletcher of Charlottetown, accused before Queen's County Magistrate James B. Johnston on two separate charges of breaking and entering at garages in Southport and West Royal on about Aug. 22. The accused pleaded guilty to both charges.
