Clothing Store At Summerside Celebrates 100th Anniversary

SUMMERSIDE — A Summerside store, MacKenzie's House of Fashions is this year celebrating its 100th anniversary. Opened in 1865 by John MacKenzie, a grandfather of the present proprietor, C. Ross MacKenzie, the store was then known as the "American Clothing Store".

The founder, a native of Cardigan, P.E.I., was popularly called the "Champion Tailor," having won several awards in world-wide competitions with leading tailors.

In 1876 he was awarded the gold medal at the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition; in 1878 the silver medal "Exposition Universelle de 1878" in Paris; in 1886 the silver medal at the Indian Colonial Exposition at London, England and later a bronze medal from the government for these achievements. The bronze medal is still in

possession of the family but the other awards, in the form of certificates, were destroyed in a store fire in 1906.

A son, M.L. Frank MacKenzie became associated in the tailoring business and following John MacKenzie's death, he added a line of men's furnishings.

He had earlier gained tailoring experience in the Ontario cities of Hamilton and Toronto as well as in Summerside.

It was while the establishment was situated on Central Street that M.L. Frank MacKenzie added another line in ladies wear specializing in ladies sample dresses and men's sport clothing as well as ordering made to measure suits from leading manufacturers.

The present proprietor entered his father's business in 1945 after completing four and a half years in the RCAF. Frank MacKenzie died in 1954.

MacKenzie's came to the present site on Water Street in the 1940's and after purchasing the building in 1952, doubled their size at that time.

In just 10 years, again there was a need for expansion and once again the size of the store was doubled but this time by utilizing the second storey as a complete ladies department.

The circular staircase leading to the second floor has become a familiar sight with most ladies as it has been the scene of many fashion shows held within the premises and has often been spoken of as "a stairway to fashion."

MacKenzie's has enjoyed a tremendous tourist trade as direct imports from the British Isles and continental Europe assure people from far and near, the closest to an European shopping tour with British and Scottish tweeds, tartans and woolen goods of many descriptions.

Britain Gets UN Okay To Control Rhodesia

UNITED NATIONS (CP)—The United Nations General Assembly approved an urgent resolution Tuesday calling on Britain to prevent minority-ruled Rhodesia from carrying out her threat to declare her independence against the wishes of the British government.

The 117-member assembly acted swiftly on the Rhodesian question by voting 107 to 2 in favor of a resolution calling on Britain to do all that is necessary to prevent a unilateral declaration of independence by Rhodesia which could touch off

racial violence involving much of the African continent.

Canada voted along with the 107 member nations while France abstained and Britain announced that she was not participating in the vote. South Africa and Portugal were the two members voting against the resolution — sponsored by 40 Afro-Asian nations.

UN sources said the Rhodesian question would be brought before the 11-nation Security Council immediately if Rhodesia's threat was carried out. A draft version of the resolution was passed Monday by a vote of 96 to 2 with France abstaining after talks in London between Prime Minister Wilson and Rhodesia's self-governing colony just north of South Africa, had broken down.

STILL ADAMANT

Smith, whose government repels 225,000 white settlers in a land of 4,000,000 black Africans, returned to Salisbury, Rhodesia's capital, and indicated there would be no immediate move toward unilateral independence. But he promised Rhodesia would be independent by Christmas.

Sir Roger Jaching, a member of the British delegation to the world organization, explained that Britain would not participate in the vote because of her long-standing position that she has sole responsibility for Rhodesia. Britain opposes the granting of Rhodesian independence until some arrangements can be worked out to assure the black Africans in the country of equal rights.

"My government has reservations concerning the competence of the United Nations in the question of Rhodesia," Sir Roger told the assembly before delegates voted on the resolution.

"The responsibility for resolving the Rhodesian constitutional problem rests with the United Kingdom," he said. "We accept this responsibility. We shall discharge it."

Sir Roger said, however, that if Rhodesia should "cut herself off from the Crown and from Britain, she would find herself practically friendless in the face of the almost solid-hostility of the world
