The Quebec Electric Lights.

The electric light works which supply the electricity for the Quebec lights are situated at the foot of Montmorency Falls, a distance of about seven miles from the city, and the power that drives them is furnished by the fall itself. The Quebec Chronicle thus describes the works: "The visitors then walked to the foot of the hill to see the works of the company, which adjoin the Montmorency mills. The motive power of the dynamo that furnish the lights is not derived from the same feeder as that of the saw mills, but is supplied by a new iron pipe 200 feet in length, formed of 1 1/2 inch boiler plates. At its head this pipe is four feet and a half in diameter and at its discharge twenty-four inches. The water which it conducts has a head of 165 feet. The water falls upon a turbine wheel of 21 inches diameter. This wheel is one of the most remarkable of its kind ever made. Notwithstanding its comparatively small size, it is capable of furnishing 1 1/2 horse power, and makes 620 revolutions a minute. It was manufactured to order by Messrs. Wilson & Co., of Platon, Ontario, and is cast in one piece, without a single bolt or anything of the kind. The eighty lights now in operation in the city are furnished by less than one hundred horse power, only two dynamos of fifty lights each being used for the purpose with plenty of spare. It will thus be seen that the present pipe and turbine wheel are capable of furnishing more than ten times the number of lights now required, while the number of similar pipes that could be fed by the Falls is practically unlimited. The dynamo were started at the Falls yesterday afternoon in presence of the visitors, all of whom manifested a very great interest in the undertaking.

It is expected that in the early part of next year, the electric motive power from the Falls of Montmorency will be applied to several printing offices and factories in this city."

The Sea Serpent is Dead.

W. W. Hollister, Jr., has discovered the veritable sea serpent at last. While wandering down by the San Augustin creek, where it empties into the ocean, on the Santa Anita ranch, the young gentleman discovered a singular looking head half buried in the sand. With the assistance of a vaquero the remains of the creature were exhumed and found to resemble strikingly the sea serpent of tradition. Its head was from 2 1/2 to 3 feet wide, and about 4 feet in length. The body is about 30 feet long, having flukes at the tail and something like a shark. The body is perhaps 2 1/2 feet in diameter in width, and a foot or more in thickness. The creature has 13 teeth on each side in the upper jaw, each tooth being about the size of a pepper box. The front teeth appeared to be badly worn or broken, as if the "serpint" had been engaged in a desperate battle, or perhaps was dying of old age. Mr. Hollister will bring his treasure trove to Santa Barbara as soon as he gets him all dug out of the sand, and our scientists may then have an opportunity to decide to what order of creature he belongs.—*Santa Barbara Independent.*

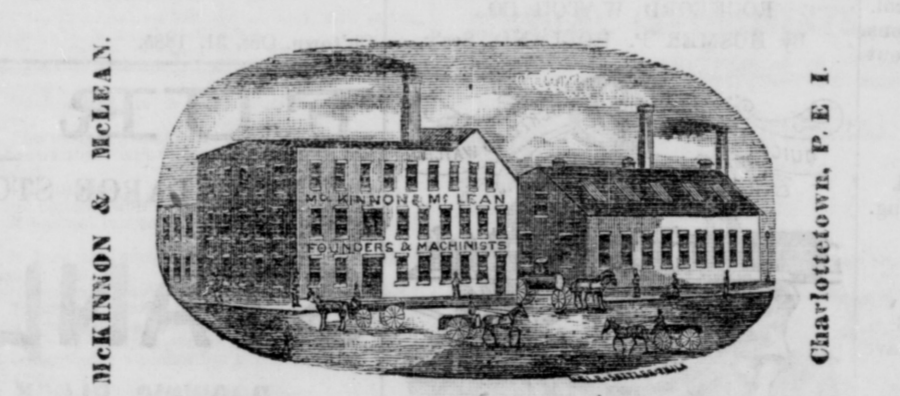
