

Big Preparations For Centennial Float Parade

Doubtless the most colorful extravaganza ever witnessed in Charlottetown will be the Centennial Float Parade to be held Monday marking the 100th anniversary of this big event. Details of this big event have been kept a closely guarded secret but it is known that many firms and private citizens have been working for months getting their floats ready. It is estimated that the parade will take in the vicinity of two and a half hours to pass through the City streets.

The huge assembly will be marshalled at Victoria Park Roadway at the end of Brighton Road at 1:00 p.m. and will move along Kent to Rochford, Haviland and Water Streets, along Water to Queen, up Queen to Kent, along Kent to Weymouth, up Weymouth to Euston, from Euston to Brighton Road to Ambrose Street, up Ambrose to McGill Ave., along McGill Ave. to North River Road to Brighton Road and the Park for dispersal.

The Centennial Committee, as can be seen by the route of the parade, have made every effort to have as large a proportion of the citizens as possible see it. The course taken goes by the two hospitals and the Sanatorium.

BUSY WEEKEND

Starting today, the people of Charlottetown will extend their hospitality to the members of the crews of the two American and one Canadian warships. The officers and men of the U. S. S. Cross, the U. S. S. Johnny Hutchins and the H.M.C.S. Buckingham will be kept occupied during their stay until Monday.

On Saturday afternoon events of great interest will be taking place including the Aquatic Sports at Victoria Park and the Philae Temple visitation and parade. The sporting event with some of the best aquatic talent from the Maritimes along with crew members of the visiting warships are expected to give a display never before seen in this part of the country.

Fittingly enough, on Sunday there will be a church parade of the Naval and Military forces in the City. With the addition of four military bands this will present an impressive spectacle.

Rules Commission Held In Contempt By Tabloid

By DAVID ROWNTREE Canadian Press Staff Writer VANCOUVER (CP) — Reginald H. Tupper said Thursday his royal commission investigation into Vancouver's police force has been held in contempt by the Toronto weekly tabloid Flash and Ray Munro, its Vancouver reporter.

"Although it may not do me or my commission any particular good, it is my responsibility to consider a fine or imprisonment," Mr. Tupper said he does not consider the matter lightly.

"I cannot promise an early decision," Mr. Tupper earlier refused a submission by T. G. Norris and chief Walter Mulligan, to make an order for committal against Munro, Louis Ruby of John Blunt Publications and editor Howard Somerville, alias Peter Dunsmuir.

MUNRO QUITS FLASH

Neil Fleishman, lawyer for Munro, said his client was prepared to accept any penalty and stand by his principles.

He said Munro resigned from Flash, effective next Monday partly because of an editorial which appeared in the July 23 issue after the commission hearings had started. It was following the publication of this article that Mr. Norris last week made the contempt motion.

Mr. Fleishman said Munro had not written articles for Flash since the hearings began July 13.

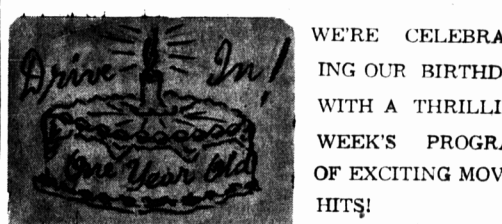
G. L. Murray, appearing for Vancouver Magazine Service Ltd., distributors of Flash here, submitted Mr. Tupper had no jurisdiction to rule on contempt other than breaches committed in the courtroom. He said an alternative submission was that the Public Inquiries Act was ultra vires of the provincial legislature.

Mr. Cummings said the commissioner had the powers of a Supreme Court judge. Displaying a July 23 issue of Flash, Mr. Cummings said it contained a bylined story by Munro.

UPHOLDS OBJECTION

The commissioner, refusing Mr. Norris's motion, upheld Fleishman's submission that no written notice had been served to the persons concerned, that it had not been proved they were in New York and Montreal where he was held, and that no charges were stated.

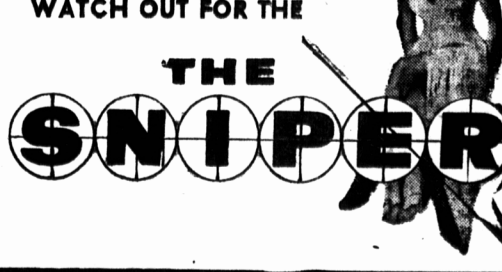
