"3. Last spring unprecedented storms wrought damage of disastrous proportions to the lobster fishing equipment of many of our fishermen. This Special Session has been called for the purpose of considering legislation which, if approved, will enable my Government to enter into an appropriate agreement with the Government of Canada under which the Province will participate in making financial assistance available to those so affected.
"4. My Government is concerned with the probable interruption of telephone communications with the Province due to proposed strike action by employees of The Island Telephone Company Limited and you will be asked to consider legislation dealing with labor relations in respect to Public Utilities.
"5. May Divine Providence bless your deliberations."

Work On S'side Rink Will Begin Immediately

A rink has been assured for Summerside and work preliminary to construction will begin at once on a large new 240 x 140 foot arena, that will also serve as an agricultural exhibition centre.
The decision to begin construction was announced at a meeting of the Summerside Trotting Association, following a meeting with the Summerside Town Council in which the council approved temporary modifications in the plans originally submitted by the Association in respect to the building and seating accommodation and cement flooring.
Although the Association had proceeded with the preparation of plans to a point where they were ready to undertake the project, the final decision to begin construction was withheld pending receipt of cost estimates from the M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd., who will be doing the construction work.
On Tuesday evening a meeting of the Association considering the cost estimates, found that construction of the rink will cost in the vicinity of \$200,000.00. After consideration of the short time left in which the weather will be favorable for building construction, some of the costs being higher than anticipated, and the immediate needs required of the building for the coming winter, it was decided that temporary modifications be referred to above could be made in the interior construction work, to facilitate putting the rink into operation with a minimum of delay.

At this meeting which was held yesterday afternoon, Mr. Gaudet outlined the proposed modifications. He pointed out that the artificial ice plant could not be installed until next winter and that the skating season with natural ice would probably be only about two months this year by the time the arena is ready for use.
For this reason, he said, only a limited sports program would be possible and that for this winter it would not be necessary to have the full seating accommodation that was eventually planned. He explained that for the same reason, it would not be necessary to have concrete flooring installed at the present time.
He pointed out that eventually, as indicated, everything would be installed to make this building complete in every respect.
He said the construction contractors, M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd., were prepared to proceed with construction at top speed. Work could be started this week he said, and its progress towards completion would depend to a large extent on the weather.
The building will be of steel frame construction, with wooden roof covered with asphalt shingles. The front will probably be of brick or brick tile construction, although the front will be of temporary structure until this work can be done in warmer weather. The sides will be of a hard grey, asbestos type material.
All of the councillors except Councillor H. E. Clark, who is out of the Province, were present at yesterday's meeting.
The Association was represented by Messrs. H. E. Gaudet, S. H. Hewitt, and G. B. Green. Councillor Andrew Perry is also a member of the Association.

this Province to participate in the loans to lobster fishermen who suffered severe losses in the storms of last spring and the early summer. Under the terms of the Federal Government will pay to the Province three-quarters of the amount of each loan made by the Province to a fisherman for the replacing of abnormal losses of lobster traps sustained by the lobster fishery due to storms.
The money which the Town of Summerside may borrow is limited to the amount of \$65,470 and it may loan to the Summerside Trotting Association Limited free of interest on a first mortgage on real estate of the said company. The above amount may be borrowed from the Provincial Government. At the same time the Town is granted authority to borrow \$50,000, which it may lend to the same Association.
Given first reading yesterday was an amendment to the Electric Power and Telephone Act whereby the Public Utility Commission may have authority to order the construction of necessary public utility poles on private property.
A minor amendment, for the purpose of inserting one word, is also being made to the Village Service Act, on motion of Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources.

S'side St. Paul's Credit Union Annual Meeting

At the eighth annual meeting of St. Paul's Credit Union, Summerside, held last evening, the report of the president Cyrus Poirier showed that the past year had been a most successful one. Assets increased by over \$18,000, as compared to the previous year. Total loans shown on the balance sheet were \$100,867.73 and shares owned by the members now stand at \$111,770.65.
The profit and loss statement for the year's activities showed an income of \$5,330, mostly derived from interest of \$4,756.96 on loans.
Of this income, after expenses had been paid, and the required percentage apportioned to guaranty and educational fund, the sum of \$258.88 had been transferred to undivided earnings.
The report indicated that membership had grown from 174 in 1946 to 606 as at September 30, 1953.
President Poirier reviewed the progress made by the Union since 1946, and as an indication of the tremendous amount of business done, he stated that since that date about 1900 loans amounting to over \$280,000.00 had been made by the credit committee. One of the very strong recommendations made by him was that disability insurance be taken up by the union so that loans made to members, who later became disabled and could not pay, be protected and wiped out, thus guarding the union against loss, and providing security for the borrower.
He felt that with the greatly increased business carried on that the time has come when a downtown office should be opened all day for the convenience of the members who are unable to get to the credit union office on Monday evenings.
The treasurer's report was submitted by Mr. Fred Gallant and each item on the balance sheet was carefully explained by him for the benefit of the members. Encouraging reports were submitted by Mr. J. E. Gillis, chairman of the credit committee, and Mr. Elmer Poirier, chairman of the audit committee.
A 2 percent dividend on shares was recommended and approved by the meeting.
Guest Speaker
The meeting was addressed by Mr. Don Smith, of Hamilton, Ontario, field representative of the Credit Union National Association (CUNA) of Canada, who said that "you are part of a tremendous movement which is having a great effect on the whole eco-
