Yankees And Red Sox Move Ahead In A.L. Race

Baseball's mightiest convincer, the home run, proved the worth of the first-place teams in both major leagues yesterday.

Four-baggers by Gene Woodling and Johnny Mize accounted for all New York Yankees' runs as they fought off Cleveland Indians' bid to overtake them in the American League race by downing the Clevelanders 3-2.

After Roy Campanella's three-run homer in the top of the 10th inning gave the front-running Brooklyn Dodgers a 6-2 victory over Chicago Cubs, winning their home debut of fledgling Cub manager Phil Cavarretta.

Dramatic honors went to Mize's blow, which gave the Yanks a temporary breathing spell in the red-hot American League fight.

Mize's home run in the eighth inning on a 3-2 count with two out and the bases empty, frustrating Cleveland's bid to end a two-season, 12-game losing streak at Yankee Stadium. Woodling's blast with a mate aboard in the sixth had wiped out a 2-0 Cleveland lead.

It was Vic Raschi's 14th victory although the Yankee right-

hander allowed eight hits, one more than Early Wynn on the Cleveland mound.

The Dodger victory extended their current winning streak to four games and cost lefty Paul Miner his 10th defeat against four wins.

Miner wriggled out of trouble until the eighth when Gil Hodges hit a long drive to left field that umpire Scooty Robb ruled a home run.

Half the Cubs rushed out to protest that the ball hit the top of the wall. First baseman Chuck Connors ultimately was ejected from the game by Robb.

The ruling stood and Hodges had his 29th circuit drive which tied the score 2-2.

In the top half of the 10th Miner, who was tagged for 12 of the Dodgers' 15 hits, walked Jackie Robinson and Hodges singled. Campanella followed with his 16th circuit drive.

Boston Red Sox shaved the Yankees' lead to percentage-point proportions as they handed Chicago White Sox their fifth straight setback by an 8-3 margin.

While rookie lefthander Leo Kiely held the sagging Chicagoans to four hits, their own pitchers walked in three runs in the first inning alone.

Don Ehrendorf's three-run homer in the eighth robbed Kiely of a shutout. Ted Williams emerged from a batting slump with four for five, celebrating his 100th hit of the season with a homer.

Detroit Tigers ended a four-game Washington winning streak by shading the Senators 2-1 on Marlin Stuart's five-hitter.

Two of the National League's better pitchers fattened their won-lost records as New York's Sal Maglie pitched the Giants to a 4-3 victory over Pittsburgh Pirates in 10 innings for his 14th triumph of the season, while lefty Warren Spahn won his 13th game of the year as Boston Braves whipped Cincinnati Reds 6-1.

For Maglie it was the 12th victory without a loss against the Pirates since he returned to the majors from the Mexican League in 1949.

St. Louis Cardinals recovered from a slow start to whip Philadelphia Phillies 9-5 with a 14-hit attack on five Phillie pitchers.

Racing Publisher Denies Charges

TORONTO, July 24 — (CP) — The Ontario Legislative Committee on gambling today heard a racing form publisher deny charges that betting odds were carried in his newspaper not for gambling but "purely and simply to show the relative merits of the horses."

J. Samuel Periman, publisher of the Daily Racing Form, persisted in that reply when Ontario C.C.F. leader E. B. Jullienne and W. J. Grummett (C.C.F. — Cochrane South) asked him "the real reason for publishing odds."

Voices rose when Mr. Grummett charged Mr. Periman with "trying to educate a race of betting people."

The Winnipeg-born newspaper man told the committee that, while bookies might use information contained in the Daily Racing Form, no effort was made to supply it to them nor was permission given for its use.

More Stars In Sports Scandal

PEORIA, Ill., July 24 — (AP) — The greatest college sports scandal in American history spread from the east to this mid-west basketball capital today snaring Bradley University's all-American Gene Melchiorre and three team-mates.

They confessed taking bribes totalling \$5,500 from gamblers to hold down scores of two games in the 1949-50 season. The pay-offs were made in New York, Philadelphia and Peoria.

Four other Bradley players, whose names were not made public, are being questioned.

Michael A. Shore, Peoria County State's Attorney, said players who had made oral statements to bribe-taking, in addition to Melchiorre, 23, were:

Fred Mann, 24, of Chicago, captain of last season's team.

Charles Grover, 22, Dundee, Ill., another regular.

Aaron Preece, 24, Canton, Ill. They were the nucleus of the team that won 28 and lost four games last season. All graduated in June.
