SIGNIFICANT.—Prominent Grits in Charlottetown, who have money up on the result of the Queen's County election are now trying to withdraw their bets.

PETER McNUTT, Esq., was, on Tuesday last, elected by a majority of 150 to fill the vacancy in the Legislative Council, caused by the resignation of Alex. Laird, Esq.

OWING to the absence of the Rev. K. McLennan, at the Presbyterian General Assembly, in St. John, there will be no services at St. James Church to-morrow, morning or evening.

MR. DONALD FARQUHARSON stated at a recent meeting in the country, that Charlottetown would give Davies and Laird a clear majority of over three hundred. This is a fair sample of the whoppers that the Grits indulge in.

THE Allan steamer "Canadian" which grounded on Truncap Shoals on Friday morning, is now at her berth in Halifax. The damages to her were slight. The mail per "Canadian" will arrive in this city this evening.

THE American Trotting Stallion "Bashaw Prince" will show an exhibition of speed on the Brighton Road, next Friday, 23rd inst., at 2 o'clock. The "Bashaw Prince" is open to trot any stallion, mare or gelding in P. E. Island, mile heats,—best three in five—from \$100 to \$500, in season or out of it.

DR. GEORGE HYDE and family left this morning for Truro where he intends taking up his residence in his old home. During his stay among us the Dr. won golden opinions for proficiency in his profession, and we are assured that success will attend him wherever he goes.

BRUTAL ASSAULT.—A young vagabond named William White, attacked Mr. John McKenna, Trunkman, on Pownal Street, yesterday, and inflicted such wounds on Mr. McKenna's face and head that his recovery was, for a time, improbable. White was arrested and the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day remanded him to jail until Mr. McKenna is able to appear against him.

IT IS SIGNIFICANT that Mr. L. H. Davies tried to prevent the Hon. Donald Ferguson, representing Mr. Brecken at West Cove Head, from speaking the full hour allowed by the meeting to the candidates; and that he tried in vain. Mr. Ferguson, strong in a good cause, is too able on the stump for Mr. Davies; and Mr. Davies didn't want to give Mr. Ferguson a chance to fully explain the questions at issue. But the electors, lovers of fair play, decided by a large majority—that he should do so. Mr. Ferguson's speech is described as "most convincing."

THE Patriot states that some official in the Post Office has detained or destroyed the circulars which Messrs Laird and Davies addressed to their constituents. On making enquiry at the city office we were told that all matter of this class had been promptly forwarded by first outgoing mail, that the circulars of both political parties were treated in precisely the same way. The circulars were posted in packages for the different offices and forwarded in most cases without opening the packages. In some instances in which they were said to have been detained they are known to have been received at office of address and delivered. The Postmaster is now investigating the matter, and if any person is found to have tampered with them, as charged, he will be severely punished, but the probability is that some of them may have been improperly directed and have thus miscarried.

MR. A. B. WARBURTON RISES TO EXPLAIN.—The publication, as nominators of Mr. Laird, of the names of gentlemen who never signed Mr. Laird's nomination papers, was, it seems, merely "an honest mistake"—in a matter about which there should have been no mistake. The insinuation of Mr. Warburton that in doing as it did the Patriot followed the example of THE EXAMINER, is unnecessary. Every man whose name appeared in the list published by THE EXAMINER, signed the nomination papers of both Brecken and Jenkins, and was a genuine nominator of those gentlemen. The lively imagination which could conjure up the prospect of an overwhelming majority for the Grit Party led by Mr. Edward Blake, would of course have no difficulty in conceiving the notion that the Editor of THE EXAMINER is aware that there is a majority of Reform voters in this County and Island. The best Grits in the world are apt to be possessed with just such freaks of fancy a day or two before an election; and the hallucinations under which Mr. Warburton labors are not at all wonderful.

Emerging Safely from a Plunge of 250 Feet.

CARBONDALE, Pa., June 11.—A man named Harkness has been engaged for several weeks in peeling bark on Moose Mountain and removing the logs to a mountain skidway near Herrick Centre, where they are rolled into the river 250 feet below. On Friday, while Harkness was at the skidway, attempting to move a large log with his cant-hook, the hook slipped, throwing Harkness down the embankment, the logs following after. As Harkness shot down the mountain side he gathered himself together, and made a fearful leap into the river. He happened to strike a clear place between the logs, and thus escaped a terrible death. He was rescued by the workmen a few feet from the landing him. Harkness held on to his canthook all the time, and was taken out of the river with it still in his grasp.

Disease from Mosquitoes.

The discovery that mosquitoes carry filaria in their probosces, and infect the human subject with that much dreaded worm parasite, has attracted considerable attention among English microscopists. Particulars of various cases are given, in which it is proved that those suffering from filaria had received the contagion from mosquitoes, and the latter have themselves been found infected with filaria. The latter are very minute worm-like parasites, which on entering the human body, breed until they increase to countless numbers. They are also said to have the power of entering and leaving the body at pleasure—usually invading the circulation in the evening, increasing till midnight and then retiring to other parts of the system.—New York Tribune.
