

Spring Park School Ready To Occupy At End Of The Month

A long felt need in the Village of Spring Park will be met when their new school now nearing completion opens its doors to receive some 240 pupils at the end of this month.

The building, modern in every detail will have eight furnished classrooms and a music room in the basement. It will house all the children above grade two. Grades one and two will continue attendance at the old school.

For a number of years now, Spring Park has been suffering acutely from overcrowding. Grade eight is at present being taught at Queen Charlotte High School. Another class was being tutored in a private home while a third has been receiving instruction in a converted plumbing shop which was moved into the school ground to help solve the overcrowding.

PLENTY OF ROOM

The eight classrooms presently being rushed to completion are large and airy with an abundance of natural lighting. All are on the first floor but ample room exists in the basement of the building for the conversion to additional classrooms. The music room is about three quarters of the length of the building and can accommodate several grades for instruction at one time.

Forgery Charge Is Adjourned

Evidence of a number of witnesses was taken in Queen's County magistrate's court Wednesday morning in the preliminary hearing of a resident of Mayfield charged with forgery. The case was adjourned one week to September 18th, by Queen's County Magistrate, Gilbert A. Gaudet.

Other cases disposed of during the Wednesday morning session of the court included that of a city resident charged with driving whilst intoxicated; the accused pleaded guilty and was sentenced by Magistrate Gaudet to seven days in the Queen's County Jail.

In addition, two persons, one a resident of Mount Stewart and the other a resident of North Rustico, were each fined \$20 and costs or twenty days for being intoxicated in a public place; a resident of Bedford for causing a disturbance in a public place. Mount Stewart Hall was fined \$25 and costs or thirty days, and was ordered by the presiding magistrate to enter into a recognizance to keep the peace and three speeders were each fined \$10 and costs.
