Costs Of Services Wanted Said Too High For Province

MONTREAL (CP) — Premier Walter Shaw has described Prince Edward Island as a province not as prosperous in the 20th century as when it joined Confederation in 1873.

He told the Montreal Advertising and Sales Executive Club yesterday that the island lacks natural resources and adequate transportation facilities, has a high tax rate and a per capita earning about the lowest of any province in Canada.

Mr. Shaw, who led his Progressive Conservative party to victory in Prince Edward Island in 1969, said the province's federal representatives have received "hardy response" to their demands over the years.

Demands in new policies covering health, welfare, education and other programs "present a financial outlay of a character beyond our financial ability," he said. The Atlantic seaboard required a continuation of special inducements to bring better services and industrial opportunities to the area.

Mr. Shaw, who will be 78 Dec. 20, was speaking to the Advertising and Sales Executive Club as part of its "Canadian panorama" project.

He said when Prince Edward Island entered Confederation it had prosperity because of developing industries and trade with the United States and Britain.

"To enter Confederation meant narrowed outlets, tariff structures that favored central Canadian areas, more distant markets, high costs of transportation and increased taxation," he said. "It was found that the purposes of Confederation were not always being fulfilled."

"We are a very small province with a population (104,629) less than in many small, urban centres. We are confronted with difficulties in the way of lack of natural resources, we are dependent on the farm and the fisheries... and within the last 20 years the number of farms has gone down from 14,000 to about 7,000."

"We have no coal deposits, no waterpower for the manufacture of electricity, no forest growth worth mentioning. Under such

conditions industrial development has been at a standstill."

POPULATION DROPS
The premier said "at the time of Confederation the population of Canada was about 3,500,000 and shortly after Confederation the population of Prince Edward Island was about 109,000. Today the population of Canada is in the vicinity of 20,000,000 and our population is about 104,000."

"We are the only province in Canada that has gone back in this regard. Can there be better proof of our dearth of opportunity?"

Mr. Shaw said his province has a higher percentage of old and very young people than any other province in Canada and welfare costs are higher. "The men and women in the vigor of

youth and middle age, whom we raised to manhood and womanhood, clothed, fed and educated, have gone to the other provinces of Canada to strengthen economy there."

A copy of Mr. Shaw's speech was released in advance of delivery.

Mr. Shaw said Prince Edward Island was doing a great service for other Canadian provinces by supplying men and women. He said the exported workers, which cost his province an estimated \$20,000 each to raise, make other provinces more stable because of their productive powers.

ALL NOT LOST

All is not lost, however, Mr. Shaw said. The province is suited for the development of industrial plants and an agreement for additional electric power from the mainland has been reached. The federal government has started construction of a \$140,000,000 causeway-bridge-tunnel to the province, with completion scheduled for 1972, and two new vocational schools are training workers.

Besides the farming industry, the province's other greatest source of revenue continued to be the tourist industry, with many Canadians and Americans taking advantage of pleasant island recreation and relaxation

Assault On Policeman Results In \$100 Fine

GEORGETOWN — Wilfred Edward McQuillan of Georgetown, pleaded guilty to assaulting Georgetown policeman Allison Grover and was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days and was further ordered to enter a recognizance in the amount of \$1,000 with two sureties of \$500 each and to keep the peace for two years, when he appeared before King's Court; Stipendiary Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday.

McQuillan also pleaded guilty to illegal possession of liquor and to squealing tires of his motor

vehicle. He was fined \$20 and costs respectively on those two charges as a result of an incident which took place last Saturday afternoon on the corner of Kent and Water Street in Georgetown. Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur McGuigan represented the Crown in all cases before the Court.

Torjorn Ulstein of Georgetown, represented by Kenneth R. MacDonald, changed an earlier plea of not guilty on a charge of obstructing Georgetown policeman Allison Grover and was fined \$75 and costs. Ulstein also changed a previous not guilty plea on an illegal possession of liquor charge and was fined \$20 and costs.

Jennie Spencer Acorn of Abney and Donna Arlene McQuarrie also of Abney were both charged under the Excise Act with possession of wash suitable for the manufacturing of spirits. Both accused had their cases adjourned to Souris at 4 p.m. on Dec. 1 to fix a date for hearing.

They were represented by J.P. Nicholson.

BRIEF AND ENTRY

David John Butler, Gaspeaux, charged with break and committing an indictable offence was remanded in custody to Dec. 1.

Everett James William MacLeod and John Charles Martell, both of Georgetown, were charged with damage to property by breaking dishes to the value of less than \$50, the property of the informant, Mrs. Florence McConnell, also of Georgetown. Both pleaded not guilty and had their cases adjourned to Dec. 1. MacLeod is represented by Kenneth R. MacDonald.

Two persons were each fined \$20 and costs for being intoxicated in a public place.

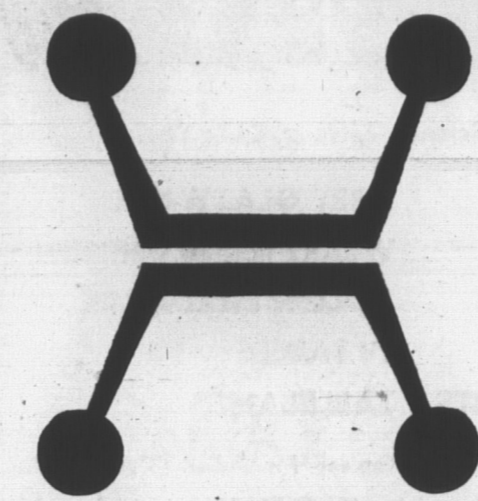

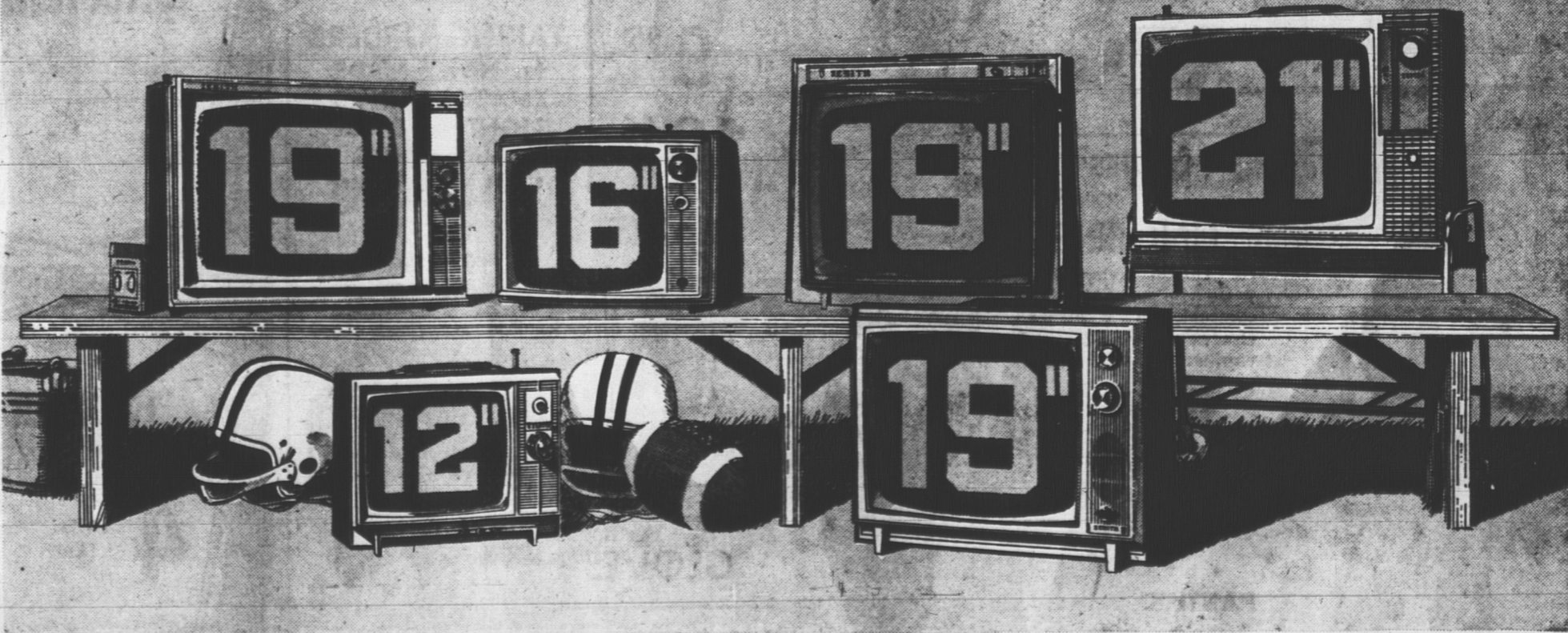
