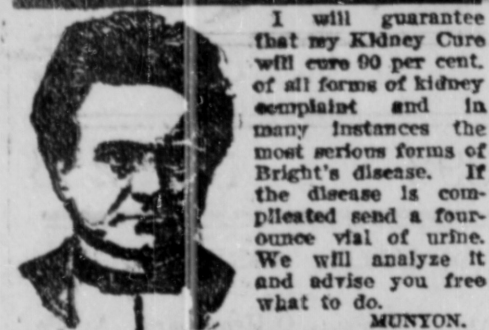

CANADIAN SEALERS CATCH.

Returns Show a Substantial Total Despite Diminution Cry.

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct 30.—The catch of the Victoria sealers this season has just been made up, and shows a substantial total, held to be at variance with the cry that there is a steady diminution of the herd. Not more than three-fourths of the fleet were out this year, and the total take was 27,865 skins for thirty five vessels, as against 30,410 last season for a much larger fleet. Only one schooner crossed to the Japan coast. These fields, as well as those of Copper Island, have been practically abandoned, on account of the long cruise and exceptional danger involved. The schooners did very well in Behring sea, notwithstanding that only spears were used, the take there being 17,370 skins.

HAROLD FREDERIC'S DEATH

Peculiar Testimony of the Woman Who Attended Deceased.

LONDON, Oct 30.—The coroner's inquest into the death of Mr. Harold Frederic, the newspaper correspondent and novelist, who died at Kenley, Surrey, to-day. Mrs. Mills, the leader of the Christian Scientists, who treated Mr. Frederic according to the peculiar methods of that sect, was called as a witness. She is a robust, swarthy, middle-aged American. She testified concerning the treatment which she applied to Mr. Frederic. She said she did not allow her patients to take drugs or doctor's orders, because they could not swing between matter and mind. The witness could not describe the physical condition of Mr. Frederic. She had not diagnosed his material sickness. Mrs. Mills told the coroner that his God was finite and her God infinite. If she should fall down and break her leg God would take care of the fractured limb.

Lawyer Mathew, on behalf of Mr. Frederic's executors, cross-examined the witness, and got answers similar to the foregoing. He warned her that she was in a serious position.

Mrs. Mills said she charged her patients a guinea a week if they could afford to pay that sum. She had no idea that taking Mr Frederic for a drive a few days before his death was the worst thing that could have been done at the time.

The taking of the testimony has not yet been finished. The inquest was adjourned for a week.

The coroner read Mr. Frederic's will, which is dated August 17th. One of the witnesses of the will testified that Mr. Frederic was perfectly sane at the time the will was witnessed.

The Nicaragua Canal.

COLON, Columbia, Oct 30.—There is much excitement here over a proposal before the Colombian Congress to protest against the construction of the Nicaragua canal. Colombia renews her claims to the Mosquito territory.

Still Believes Him Dead.

TRENTON, Oct 27.—Mrs Ireland, the wife of Dr Ireland, who disappeared so mysteriously from Montreal, places no credence in the story that letters to Trenton addressed in her husband's writing were sent ashore from steamers touching at Father Point. She states that she has received no communication from her husband, whom she believes to be drowned. Other relatives of the doctor know of no letter from him or any other person in connection with the case.

Another Plague Victim.

VIENNA, Oct 30.—The death is announced of Fraulein Pecha, one of the two nurses who attended the late Herr Barisch, of Professor Nothnagel's pathological laboratory, the victim of the outbreak of bubonic plague in Vienna.

PROBABLE CABINET CHANGE.

Will They get Rid of Him ?

OTTAWA, October 30.—A federal cabinet change is on the tapis. Lieutenant-Governor Patterson is anxious to retire from his position in Manitoba, and Mr. Sifton is being urged by Sir Wilfrid Laurier to accept it.

There is a growing feeling among the liberals that "Sifton must go," and unless the can be get rid of before a session of parliament, the party managers feel that it is impossible just to say what will happen. But the trouble is Sifton does not want to go. He is still "young Napoleon," and prefers to impose his imperious will on the people of the North West, as well as on his colleagues. Matters cannot go on much longer as they are without jeopardizing the interests of the party as a whole. In Manitoba, the liberals are split up into rival Sifton and Richardson factions, with Richardson's men at present on top. Unless Sifton can be shelved and put out of politics altogether, a quarrel is likely to injuriously affect Greenway's chances when he appeals to the province next year. Accordingly Sifton has been offered the lieutenant-governorship of Manitoba.

Liberals here are praying fervently that he will accept. Should Sifton, do so he will be able to exercise more direct personal supervision of the editorial columns of the Winnipeg Free Press, which paper "Events" says he bought for \$42,000. As to Sifton's successor, it is difficult to foretell what would happen as the western liberal contingent does not contain any men big enough for the job.

Prince Louis Napoleon.

LONDON, Oct 30.—The Rom' correspondent of the Times says: "I learn that Prince Louis Napoleon, who was supposed to have rejoined his regiment in Russia, is really at Geneva, where he has raised, on special authority, a loan of such dimensions as excludes the hypothesis of its being required for private purposes. Prince Louis has long been the candidate of the Bonapartists for the French throne in preference to his brother, Prince Victor."
