

**LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS**

**THE WEATHER.**—Moderate to fresh north and north-east winds, fair and cool with a few showers.

**LABOR DAY RACES.**—It is expected that there will be at least seventy-five excursionists from St. John at the Labor Day races in Charlottetown. So says the Telegraph.

**CHARLOTTETOWN BOARD OF TRADE.**—A special meeting of this corporation will be held in the Masonic Temple Building on Tuesday next, the 24th August, at 7.30 o'clock, p. m. A full attendance of members requested. — Edmund T. Higgs, Secretary.

**NOVA SCOTIA EXHIBITION.**—Entries for live stock, poultry, dogs, dairy produce, ladies' work, fine arts and all classes of manufacture close on or before Saturday, September 11th. Grain, field roots, fruit and horticultural products on or before Tuesday, September 21st. The speed competitions close Saturday, September 11th. These dates for closing entries will be strictly enforced and intending exhibitors should govern themselves accordingly.

**NOVA SCOTIA GOLD.**—John C. Oland showed the Halifax Recorder on Thursday a box of rich bearing quartz, regular gold-bearing, out of which the precious metal shone like corn on a cob. It was part of a shot fired Wednesday at the Symon Kay property, Montague, and it is estimated that over \$1,000 in gold was the result, nearly \$2,000 was taken out during the day. The small parcel Mr. Oland had had over \$300 in gold. The shaft working was started on Monday, and from the first shots the result has been of the same nature as that above.

**MILITARY FUNERAL.**—The funeral of the late Walter Kinsman took place yesterday afternoon, and a great many people turned out to pay the last tribute of respect to the memory of a good citizen. Mr. Kinsman was a gunner in the Artillery, and the funeral was with military honors. There was a large turnout of the Artillery and Engineers, and the casket was drawn on a gun-carriage. The Artillery band was in attendance. Mr. Kinsman was a member of the Ancient Order of Hibernians and that organization also participated. The service at St. Dunstan's Cathedral was conducted by Father Johnston. The interment was in the Roman Catholic Cemetery.

**A CATTLE PLAGUE.**—During the latter part of July and the first of the present month J. Ward, of Diligent River, N. S., was so unfortunate as to lose three of his cows from some unknown cause; another man at the same place also lost a cow. A few days ago Mr. Ward discovered another of his cows in a bad condition, and proceeded to treat her. He first bored a hole in her horns—from which a large amount of matter came out. He then filled them with turpentine, he next gave a mixture of and sulphur, which he placed in the cow's manger to be inhaled, which largely increased the flow of matter from the horns, with the result that the cow has recovered. Reports from various parts of the country say that a number of other farmers have met with losses from the same cause.—Parrsboro Leader.

**THE MACKENZIES OF APPECROSS.**

Alexander, son of Colin Cam of Kintail, chief of the Mackenzies, was the first Mackenzie of Coull. He purchased the estate of Appl-cross, which was larger than that of Coull, and gave it to his eldest son, Roderick. He gave Coull to Kenneth, his second son. He died in 1650. Roderick, first of Applecross, was succeeded by his son, John Mollach, or Hairy John. John Mollach had four sons, Alexander, Roderick, Kenneth of Aldeny, and John Oz. Alexander was succeeded by his son Roderick, and Roderick by his son John, who died without issue.

Roderick, second son of John Mollach, had a son whose name I do not know. That son was married and had at least two sons, Roderick and Malcolm. Roderick the elder of these two, was known as Ruairidh Ruadh, Rory Roy, or Redhaired Rory. Malcolm was married and had at least one son. He died at Kishorn about 1820.

After the death of John, fifth of Applecross, Rory Roy became the representative of the Applecross family. He was married and had at least three sons and a daughter. He came to Prince Edward Island about the year 1805 and settled in Belfast, near Pinette Bridge, on the farm occupied by the late John Stewart. He left Belfast and went to Nova Scotia. He settled there on the Gulf Shore between Wallace and Pugwash. He was the author of two or three Gaelic songs.

Colie, eldest son of Roderick Roy Mackenzie, and representative of the Applecross family, had a saw mill on the south shore of Wallace Bay. He married a Miss Stewart from Prince Edward Island and had several children.

I trust some one will be so kind as to send me full information with regard to Rory Roy Mackenzie and his descendants. I should also like to know the name of his father, mother and wife.
