NEW POWER PLANT PROPOSED

S'ide Tax Rate Remains Unchanged At \$25 Per M

SUMMERSIDE — Indications that the present tax structure of \$25 per thousand will be maintained in the current budget were expressed last night at a meeting of the Summerside Town Council by finance chairman Leo Wood. Mayor W. A. Currie presided with all councillors present as well as Town Manager J.A. Brophy.

Councillor Wood said work has been completed on the current budget and that much discussion was necessary to try to maintain the present tax structure. He stated that school demands have increased \$33,000 over last year and these must be met by reductions in the other departments.

Councillor Wood moved a resolution that the office hours for the town during the summer season beginning June 15th and continuing until further notice be: 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Thursday; Friday 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.; closed all day Saturday and holidays. This of course does not apply to the police department.

Councillor W.E. MacCausland, commenting on the resolution, said it underlines a great deal of discussion that has taken place in council during the past few years and added he was happy to see the town taking this important step.

Another resolution by Councillor Wood approved the annual overdraft with the Bank of Nova Scotia in the amount of \$243,000. Councillor Wood explained that this overdraft is an annual practice used for operating expenses until taxes are paid.

REPORT RECEIVED

Councillor W.E. MacCausland, chairman of the electric light committee said that Engineering Services Ltd. had submitted a report regarding the purchase of a new generating plant in which they propose three generating units with varying capacities. He said they also embody a recommendation as to the choice of a unit.

However, Councillor MacCausland said he felt that it would be wise to wait until the council hears from Maritime Electric who are carrying out a survey regarding the feasibility of buying town-owned rural lines, before making a decision on the purchase of a generating unit. He stated that if Maritime Electric decide against buying the lines the town will need a unit with a larger capacity than if the lines are sold.

Councillor MacCausland read the report of the Halifax Board of Trade and A.W. Gaudet of the Charlottetown Board of Trade. Other representatives are A. Murray MacKay of the Maritimes Transportation Commission and Nelson A. Mann, executive secretary of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council.

Four directors-at-large as yet unnamed, are to be appointed by the executive council and two representatives are to be appointed by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

Councillor MacCausland stated that underground wiring would be installed to Eaman's Drug Store, MacArthur building parking lot at the same time the work is being carried out at the Stedman building now under construction.

Councillor Ernest Morrison, in his report, said a new guard rail had been installed around Civic Stadium to prevent cars from damaging it; also that the steel work in the Stadium has been thoroughly scraped and painting was due to start today.

Resolutions presented by Councillor Morrison included the appointment of Alexander Horne as a member of the Board of School Trustees for a period of three years; the appointment of Walter H. Peters as building inspector for the town at an annual remuneration of \$200; and that Scotia Sprinklers Ltd., be engaged to install a sprinkling system at a price of \$12,900 in Civic Stadium.

SPRINKLER SYSTEM

Town manager Joseph Brophy told the council that the present fire insurance rate is \$2.05 per one thousand dollars. With the sprinkler system installed he said it would be less than forty cents per thousand. Mr. Brophy said the council should get the sprinkler system installed as soon as possible as a larger rebate will be forthcoming if done at once. He added the sprinkler would pay for itself in about five years or less. Councillor MacCausland said there is \$200,000 insurance on the Stadium and after quick figuring, said it will save the town \$12,000 in a period of four years.

SPEED REDUCED

Councillor Fred Arsenault, chairman of the police, fire and abattoir presented the police report from Chief of Police Peter R. White in which it was stated that the speed watch was used several times during the month but results have fallen off in comparison with other months so it appears to have been used effectively and is now paying off with reduced speed in the town, its sole object.

Councillor Arsenault presented a resolution granting the Ladies Aid of Prince County Hospital the authority to hold tag days July 7, 8th.

Councillor Llewellyn Rogers, chairman of water and sewerage reported that a new hydrant had been installed on Liston Ave. and several main sewers have been flushed for the summer. He stated three old homes have installed water but sewerage thus eliminating the more outside "privies" in the town.

PAVING TO START

Councillor R. B. Dewar, street committee chairman said that paving on Hawthorne Avenue would start today with paving on Victoria Road to go underway shortly. He added that the storm sewer job on Ottawa Street is nearly completed and that shelling has been spread on Northumberland Street and Palmer Street. He said street maintenance has

been taken care of with calcium chloride having been put on un-paved streets. He commended Arthur Clark of Summerside for the capable way in which he handled the Raceway negotiation as a result of which the Raceway has been purchased by a group of Summerside business men and horsemen.

MAYOR THANKED

Before adjournment Councillor MacCausland stated "I would like to take this opportunity on behalf of the council to commend your worship for the ever increasing responsibilities placed on you by the executive director and president of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities. We note that the Town of Summerside has again been signally honored by your re-appointment for the third successive time to the vice-presidency of this important national body and we also note with pride that you have been chosen on several occasions to chair various sessions of the convention. This is undoubtedly brought about by the recognition of your municipal knowledge and ability and untiring efforts and interests to solve the ever increasing municipal problems. On behalf of the town council I congratulate and thank you."

His worship thanked Councillor MacCausland and replied "It is an honor to Summerside rather than to me."

Others taking part in the discussion will be Frank Wellard, co-ordinator of rehabilitation, Halifax, N.S. Dr. Tudor Genchiff, orthopedic surgeon, Charlottetown, Dr. L.E. Bashow, medical director, Forest Hill Rehabilitation Centre, Fredericton, N.B.; Russell Ewing, psychologist, P.E.I. department of health; J.D. Milligan, supervisor, vocational rehabilitation department of education, Halifax, N.S. and Daniel Rooney, director, Nova Scotia Society for the Care of Crippled Children, Halifax.

Mr. Crandlemire is a graduate of N.B. Teachers College, and received his B.A. from the University of New Brunswick in 1946 and his B. Ed. in 1951. He has 15 years of teaching experience behind him and has been in his present position as co-ordinator and director of rehabilitation for the province of New Brunswick since 1954.

He is past president of Fredericton Civil Service Association; past president of Fredericton Kiwanis Club; past president of Marysville United Baptist Mens Brotherhood; representative on National Advisory Committee for the rehabilitation of disabled persons; director of Central New Brunswick Branch of Mental Health Association; and a member of the board of directors, New Brunswick co-ordinating council for the handicapped.

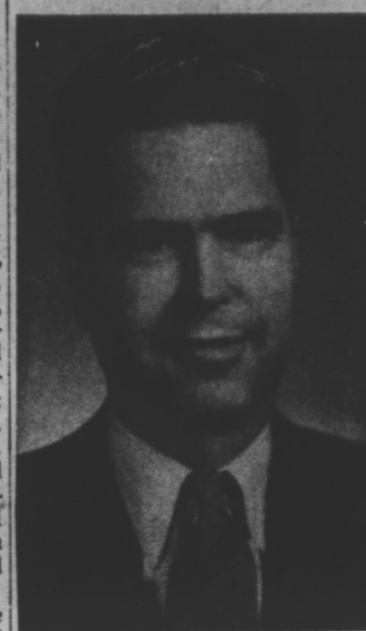
Not Guilty Plea Entered

SOMETHING NEW—BABY PHEASANTS

Thirteen baby pheasants from a setting of twenty eggs was described as most encouraging by officers of the West Prince Branch of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association.

The New St. Lawrence Seaway "unlocking the heart of a continent" and Maritimes Transportation Commission studies of the effect of the seaway on Maritime ports was making this a "memorial year."

W. Scammel Case, Canadian Chamber of Commerce, first vice-president, said in a panel discussion that in Canada — New England-West Indies trade it is necessary to realize Canada has control over her destiny while the West Indies has not.

He said that despite Canadian efforts the United States was capturing the market on price and its surplus disposal program made it possible to substantially underbid Canadian producers in some fields. The U. S. had the advantage of shorter distances from its southern ports to Jamaica and Trinidad, the chief centres of population.
