

Tory Party Backing Seen For Mac's ECM Program

 LONDON (Reuters) — Overwhelming Conservative party backing for the British government's bid to enter the European Common Market has been demonstrated by the publication of the agenda for the ruling party's annual conference next month.

Of about 30 resolutions on the subject contained in the agenda, two-thirds favor the government's efforts to join the six-nation trade group, promising adequate Commonwealth and other safeguards. Several express reservations and only two are flatly opposed.

But the agenda's provisional resolutions were received from local party organizations a week before the Commonwealth prime ministers' conference opened earlier this month, and therein may lie a telling point.

TERMS CRITICIZED
 For at that conference, which ended last week, one Commonwealth leader after another bluntly attacked the terms Britain has been able to get for joining the market, and a considerable amount of criticism is expected to be directed at the terms available from the Common Market. It may stimulate a new campaign from the anti-Commonwealth section of the party.

The party's anti-market leaders made a strong bid at last year's conference to put the brakes on the government move. But the 1,000-strong assembly routed

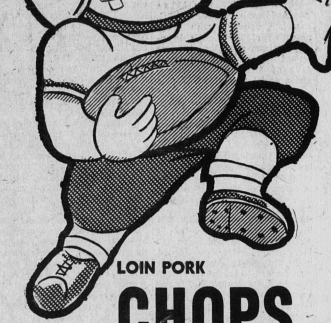
