

# Montague Firemen Exercise Modern Resuscitation Gear

Instructions were given to Montague Fire Department Monday night, on the use of the resuscitator, inhaler, and aspirator, by Mr. Gordon MacDonald and Mr. Paul Cudmore of the Disaster Relief section of the Red Cross.

The meeting was well attended and among those present was Judge J.S. DesRoches, local chairman of the Disaster Relief Committee. All the firemen present had the opportunity of watching familiar with the handling of it. They were put through a routine of artificial respiration in conjunction with the equipment.

Mr. Cudmore stressed the need for more people to be familiar with the use and training to handle at least the inhaler, which is the one most commonly used.

Previous to the instruction period the regular monthly meeting was held with Chief Coffin presiding. The minutes were read and approved and all business disposed of. It was also decided that for the summer months that the monthly meeting would not be held but that meetings be held at the discretion of the Fire Chief. At the close of the meeting, the Chief expressed his thanks to Mr. MacDonald and Mr. Cudmore for their very interesting instructions.

# Flemming Reissues Call For Atlantic Conference

 FREDERICTON (CP) — Husky Hugh John Flemming settled his 200-pound frame behind the premier's desk here Tuesday and performed the first official act of his second term as head of New Brunswick's Progressive Conservative government.

It was a renewed invitation to Liberal premiers in the other Atlantic provinces for a conference on "down east" economic development.

"Such a meeting can't help but be beneficial," he told reporters. "Nothing but good can come of it."

Back in the drivers seat with emphatic "carry over" orders from New Brunswick voters, Hugh John — as he is known — lost no time. He sent telegrams to Nova Scotia's Premier Hicks, Prince Edward Island's Matheson and Newfoundland's Samlwood reaffirming his bid of April 29 for a premier's conference here July 2 or any other convenient date.

**DOOMED MAN GETS NEW TRIAL**  
 TORONTO (CP) — Robert Fitton, who was to be hanged in 21 days for the rape-slaying of 13-year-old Linda Lampkin, Tuesday was granted a new trial.

Fitton was arrested Jan. 18, the day the young girl's body was found, with her own scarf knotted tightly around her neck, on a waterfront street.

He was convicted April 27 and sentenced to be hanged July 10. During the trial, testimony was that Fitton, 21, had had sexual relations with the girl, and that she had been raped just before she was killed.

The appeal was based on what Fitton's lawyers said was an inadequate charge of the jury by the trial judge, Mr. Justice R. W. Treleavan of the Supreme Court of Ontario.

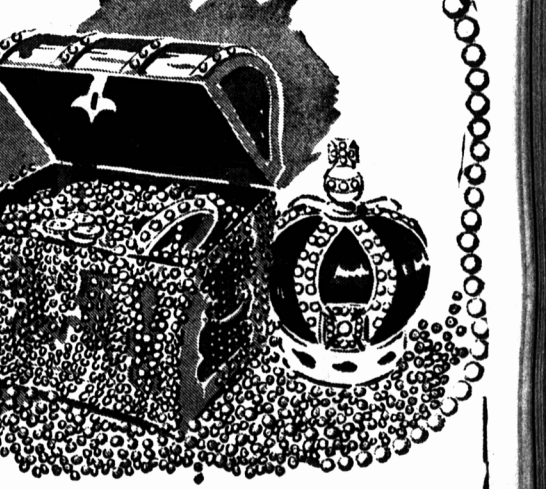
