MURDERED BY CHINESE.

More Facts About the Capture of the Pegu by Pirates.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 26.—By the steamer Copoc, which arrived at Hong Kong, advices are received giving the first full details of the looting and murder on the steamer Pegu by Chinese pirates on the Penang coast on July 8. Eleven Chinese men and one woman boarded the steamer at Penang, one of the stopping places, where pepper was taken in. Capt. Ross, according to his custom, searched the men for weapons, but did not search the woman. She carried under her Malay sarong the weapons with which the bloody work was done.

While the Captain and Chief Engineer Craigie were at dinner six armed Chinese burst into the saloon and attacked them. The officers were unarmed and defended themselves with chairs, but were terribly slashed about the hands and arms. Both reached the deck. Craigie made his way to the engine room where he bolted the door and was safe. He wasn't badly hurt. The Captain sprang on deck, where he was attacked by one of the Chinese with a carving knife from the table, who literally disembowled the Captain. As he fell the others hacked him with their knives, and he soon breathed his last. The pirates then attacked the mate and steerman, and cut them down on the bridge. The safe was opened and \$15,000 taken. Two boats were lowered and the pirates made off with their booty. When the steamer reached Telak the wounded were taken ashore. The vessel's deck looked like a charnel house, being spattered with the blood of the slaughtered victims.

Captain Ross had been in the Malay trade for fourteen years. Twice before he had been attacked by Chinese pirates, but he was fearless. The place where the crime occurred is the same where a steamer was once before attacked and looted, the weapons in this case being smuggled on board in the bedding of a spurious sick woman.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

—The King of Benin, who recently made obeisance to the British political agent by rubbing his forehead three times against the earth, is the same dusky potentate who a few months ago murdered an English consul and then sent his rings to the British admiral with an insolent message to the white Queen. Under the circumstances, the King of Benin seems to have been let off too easily, but as he evidently thinks no small beer of himself, no doubt the rubbing of his forehead on the earth will give him as much pain as a long term of hard labor, especially as he has wandered for some months in the bush and must have missed his accustomed luxuries.

—The Liberal St. John Globe complains of the Liberal Toronto Globe that it "is doing great injury to sound principles of trade, and to the Liberal party as well, by the jingoism on this (the log duties) and on many similar subjects with which its columns are now overflowing." The Montreal Gazette, commenting on this fact says: "The St. John Globe does not allow for the zeal of a new convert. The Toronto Globe has not only to let the Canadian people know that it is loyal, but it has to destroy their memory of the articles it used to print to show that to be zealous to British and Canadian interests was to divorce the Dominion from the continent to which it belonged."

—Here is how the Mail and Empire puts it: "If we import goods from a British possession, the duty is twelve and a half per cent. higher than on like goods from foreign lands. If we import from Germany the duty is the same as the duty on like English goods, provided that in coming to Canada the goods do not touch at a British port. Should we take the German goods to Great Britain, and bring them over on British ships, then a duty of twelve and a half per cent. additional is collected. We give the European nations the same rates of duty as we give to British producers. But we decline to permit foreign goods destined for Canada to pass through British ports, and to come on British ships. This is what we call a British preference—a voluntary tribute to our British brethren in celebration of the jubilee year."

A hat was placed on the ground and money gifts were next in order. The separate gifts rose as high as \$10, and as each gift was thrown into the hat a man standing near gave an unearthly yell and shouted out twice its value.—Christian Work.

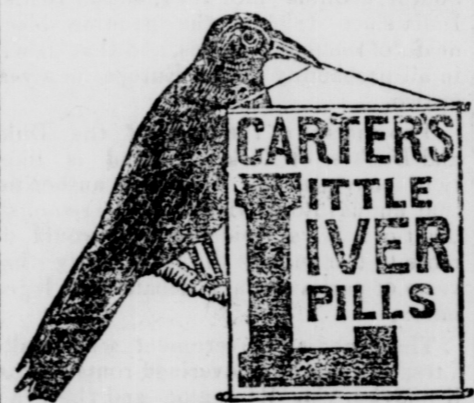
THE ARTIST'S PRIVILEGE.

No Phase of Life Which the Realist May Not Touch.

In a defense of his literary methods Arthur Morrison, the English novelist, writes in The New Review:

"I have been asked, in print, if I think that there is no phase of life which the artist may not touch. Most certainly I think this; more, I know it. It is the artist's privilege to seek his material where he thinks well, and it is no man's privilege to say him nay. If the community has left horrible places and horrible lives before his eyes, then the fault is that of the community, and to picture these places and these lives becomes not merely his privilege, but his duty. It was my fate to encounter a place in Shore-ditch where children were born and reared in circumstances that gave those children no reasonable chance of living decent lives, where they were born foredoomed to a criminal or semicriminal career. It was my experience to learn the ways of this place, to know its inhabitants, to talk with them, eat, drink and work with them.

"For the existence of this place and for the evils it engendered the community was responsible, and every member of the community was and is responsible in his degree. If I had been a rich man, I might have attempted to discharge my peculiar responsibility in one way; if I had been a statesman, I might have tried another. Being neither of these things, but a simple writer of fiction, I endeavored to do my duty by writing a tale wherein I hoped to bring the condition of this place within the comprehension of others. There are those who say I should have turned away my eyes and passed by on the other side, on the very respectable precedent of the priest and the Levite in the parable."
