THE BRITISH ARMY.

Some very interesting information as to the position and prospects of the British army is contained in the annual report of the Inspector-General of Recruiting just issued. In view of the war, it is gratifying to note that 1899 was the best year on record since the introduction of the short service system. This is all the more gratifying because the year began badly. The number and quality of the recruits for the first three-quarters of 1899 were considerably below the average, doubtless owing to the flourishing state of trade and the increasing demand for labor. But as soon as the war broke out both the number and quality of the recruits went up with a bound. During November alone the regular army was increased by over 5,000 men, and the militia by 4,000. Altogether, 40,207 recruits joined the army during the year, and 40,653 the militia—both advances on 1898, when the numbers were 38,418 and 40,108 respectively, while in 1896 they were only 27,509 and 35,412. The additional enlistments enabled considerable additions to be made to the standing army, drafting into the reserve being suspended for the time being. The 3rd Battalion Coldstream Guards has been increased by three companies; the 3rd Battalion Scots Guards was formed; while the 3rd Battalion Royal Fusiliers, the 3rd Lancashire Fusiliers, and the 2nd Cameron Highlanders have been raised to full strength. The Royal Field Artillery has six new batteries, and the Royal Warwickshire Regiment has formed one company of its new 4th Battalion. Eight cavalry regiments have had 60 men apiece added them, and the Army Service Corps and the Army Medical Corps receive additions of 1,000 and 150 men respectively. All these together do not amount to the increase of 35,000 men voted by Parliament on 30th October, but they have doubtless been made up since the date of the report, for the Inspector-General states that the number of men enlisting is steadily increasing: "The large number of enlistments which have taken place since the commencement of the war shows that, when necessary, there are ample recruits forthcoming if there is a chance of seeing active service. What is required, however, is to attract sufficient numbers of men to join the army when there is no such immediate prospect of active service. The only solution of the problem appears to be the assurance of work on leaving the colors."

ON THE BRITISH SIDE.

"I am entirely on the British side in this war in South Africa," says the King of Sweden and Norway, now on a visit to this country, in an interview with a representative of the Associated Press today. "You may make it quite clear that I have no sympathy with the Boers, and I will tell you I find it difficult to understand either the principles of a religion which is apparently a monopoly of the Burghers of the two States, or of the political manifestations of a government which seems to have refused most of the reforms suggested by the British, and which closed its negotiations by invading British territory. In my opinion the English-speaking races are the exact opposite of the Boers, because they are among the best colonizers of the world when savage and uncivilized territories have to be reclaimed. No greater proof of this could have been given than the splendid outburst of loyalty at home and the heroism in the field which every British colony has so unanimously displayed. That is the good which has come to Great Britain out of the evil which any war brings in its train, and that will be her compensation for the many disappointments she has suffered hitherto. You may make it quite clear that I have no sympathy whatever with the Boers, and that I will give no support to the attempts they are making to secure the countenance or co-operation of other countries."

PREPARES FOR LONG WAR.

The Lorenzo Marques correspondent of the London Daily Mail, telegraphing recently, says:—

"A French steamer has arrived with 10,000 bags of coffee and 10,000 bags of sugar, consigned to a syndicate which is buying for the Pretoria Government. Four more steamers with similar consignments are expected this month. It is evident that the Transvaal intends making a long resistance. "The Boers have begun constructing fortifications at Lydenburg where they continue storing provisions. There is also evidence of an intention to connect the unused Selate Railway running northwest from Momatipoort, with Lydenburg, to destroy the Netherlands Railway as a last resort, and to hold the Drakensburg Range as an eastern barrier, with Lydenburg as headquarters. If this plan should be adopted the campaign will become exceedingly difficult.

"The Portuguese authorities here objected to H. M. S. Forte using her searchlights, and they next objected to night patrols. Consequently the cruiser now steams outside the harbor nightly to avoid a possible repetition of the Maine disaster."

The Boers, when they quit Wepener left their dead unburied. The instinct that led them in the early engagements of the war to hide their losses seems to be dying out. The British have had to bury Boer dead in several instances lately. The fact is one of the signs of the enemy's demoralization.

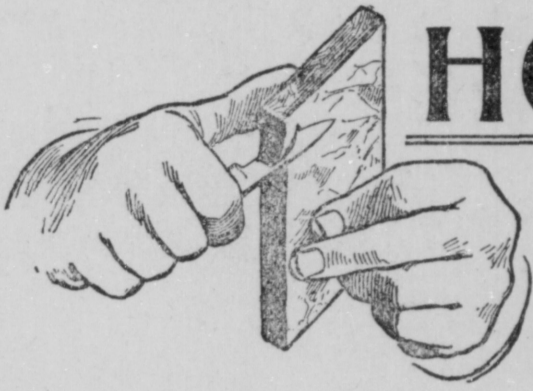
