MR HERBERT SPENCER has arrived in Montreal in poor health.

THE exports from Summerside for the last seven days are valued at \$10,187.

ABOUT eight hundred barrels of oysters have been already shipped from Summerside.

ONE hundred horses, shipped from the Upper Provinces, arrived at Winnipeg a few days ago.

MR. RANKIN, the aquatic editor of the Boston Herald, is at the Halifax Regatta representing his journal.

THE Superior Court has decided that the Quebec tax upon commercial travellers is constitutional.

A BEAR has been visiting the orchards and gardens between Point du Chene and Shediac, causing no little annoyance.

INSPECTOR CALDWELL, of Summerside, has already collected more than \$500 fines from convictions under the Scott Act.

PETERS & PETERS intend starting a branch office at Summerside. One of the offices under the Clifton House has been secured by them.

A MEETING of the British American Book and Tract Society will be held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall on Friday evening at 8 o'clock. A number of gentlemen interested in the work will address the meeting.

THE brigantine "Lorne," of Halifax, Capt. Charles Fye, from Lunenburg, N. S., where she left on the 15th ult., bound to St. Jago, Cuba, with a cargo of dry fish, arrived at Halifax, on Tuesday night in a dismantled condition.

THE Ottawa team prize winners, in the Minister of Militia's Match, were: 1st Guelph Rifle Association, \$45; and, 53rd Battalion, \$30; 3rd, 8th Royal Rifles, \$24; 4th, P. E. Provincial Rifle Association, \$14. An individual prize of \$5 was won by Sergeant Major McDougall, who made 55 points out of a possible 70.

THE Toronto Exhibition was formally opened on Wednesday by Premier Mowatt, who, in the absence of the Governor, made a clever speech on the exhibition and the proud position of Canadian industry. The exhibition is far from complete, but it remains open next week and additions are constantly being made.

THE Eastern Chronicle, of New Glasgow, says:—Fashionable circles in Pictou were in a flutter of excitement yesterday morning over the marriage of Dr. Bayne, of Kingston, to Miss Primrose, eldest daughter of H. Primrose, Esq., of Pictou. The happy couple left for P. E. Island by the noon boat. We wish them prosperity and happiness.

REV. DR. RICE, the newly elected president of the General Methodist Conference, is well known in the Maritime Provinces, having entered the ministry in New Brunswick, of which province he is a native. He married a daughter of Messrs. John and D. H. Starr, of Halifax. He is at present Superintendent of Missions in Manitoba. Rev. Dr. Williams was elected Vice-President, and Rev. Dr. Sutherland, Secretary.

A MONTREALER went to Port Huron last week, and met two men with whom he started to walk along the railway track. At the hotel 21 rooms were reserved for them. They have arranged to spend the day quietly in the city and proceed to San Francisco via the Rock Island road to-morrow morning.

THE sum of \$34,000 in United States and Railway bonds were stolen from an office on State Street, Boston, in July. The thieves are yet unknown, but a man named Merritt Seymour was captured on the 3th inst., while conducting the sale of the stolen bonds in Wall Street.
