

Local and Other Items.

PERSONAL.—Lewis Carvell, Esq., arrived in town on Saturday evening.

Snow is reported to have fallen in the Upper Ottawa district on Friday.

The quarterly meeting of the Benevolent Irish Society, will be held in St. Patrick's Hall this evening, at 8 o'clock.

OUR public squares are at present pictures of neglect. No movement has yet been made to put them in repair.

I. O. O. F.—Nomination of officers for "St. Lawrence Lodge," will take place at Odd Fellows' Hall this evening, at 8 o'clock.

DIPHTHERIA.—An undertaker conveys the somewhat startling information that seven children in this city, this morning, lay dead—diphtheria being the cause of death in each case. We sympathize with the bereaved parents.

THE New Glasgow Chronicle reports that two large whales were seen in St. George's Bay, off the coast of Antigonish, on Thursday of last week, by the passengers and crew of the steamer Princess of Wales, on her passage from Pictou to Port Hakesbury.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning, George Thompson, was fined \$3 and costs, for being drunk and incapable; Hugh McDonald, drunk and disorderly on the premises of Theodore Morrow, was fined \$6 or 1 month's imprisonment.

A SPECIAL meeting of the Caledonia Club will be held in St. Lawrence Hotel to-morrow (Tuesday) evening, at half-past seven o'clock. As this meeting is called for the purpose of making arrangements for the Grand Scottish Gathering to be held this summer, of which due notice will be given, every member of the Club is particularly requested to attend.

FOR the past week, the signal service has been carried on at the Block House, and we, as yet, have no signal to respond in this city. What benefit is a signal at the Block House to our citizens? It cannot be seen by the naked eye, and is, therefore, as worthless as if it had never been hoisted. If the Government wishes to give signal service, let them do so wholly, and not leave out the most important part, as at present.

DIPHTHERIA.—A River John, Pictou, correspondent of the Eastern Chronicle writes that diphtheria in its most malignant form still lingers among us. The cases have been few of late, but they have been very fatal. The family of Mr. Archibald Langille, one of our ship carpenters, have been severely afflicted. Four fine promising boys have died of this disease within the last three weeks—twins, 12 years old, and the other two, 9 years and 10 years old, respectively, and another—their only daughter is now lying at the point of death with the same disease. Such appalling bereavements call for much sympathy towards these sorrowing parents.

ON Saturday evening, the residents of the West End, bordering on Rochford Square, were disturbed by the loud report of fire-arms in that vicinity. Many living at the South Side rushed to their doors and saw smoke rising over the houses at the North Side. A young man who was at the time passing Kent Street before the residence of Mr. John Carroll, noticed some shots lodge in Mr. Carroll's house. He informed them of the fact, and, on examination, they found grape shot lodged in the clapboards. Last fall a gun was discharged in the same direction, and the contents broke several panes of glass in Mr. Carroll's windows. He suspects a fisherman who resides at the North Side of the square, of being the party who fired; and he, this morning, issued a warrant for his arrest.

Miscellaneous News.

The Russians have massed 17,000 men and 125 guns in a central position for Constantinople, Adrianople and Gallipoli.

A City of Mexico dispatch says Diaz is so firmly fixed in the Presidency that the Lerdist movement is a hopeless one.

Another colliery horror has occurred in Lancashire. The number of persons killed is unknown, but is believed to be very large.

The report that the Crown Prince of Germany had assumed the Regency is contradicted, but it is believed that he has taken the temporary control of affairs.

The Russians intend occupying Ploesti. The English and Russian forces will not be withdrawn till the end of the Congress, on account of the endeavors of the Turks to provoke hostilities.

James F. McLean, of Newark, N. J., while dressing a Russian hid in a tannery recently, rubbed a pimple on his chin and inoculated it with poison virus. His head swelled to an enormous size and death ensued.

The Duke of Connaught, a London correspondent hints, wanted to marry the daughter of an Irish earl, but his royal mother insisted on the alliance with the daughter of Prince Frederick Charles, considering that one subject in the family is enough.

Lord Beaconsfield's mission to Berlin will be the most interesting event in the present century of England's foreign politics. If he can satisfactorily settle the "Asian mystery" of the Eastern Question, a life of many triumphs will be fitly crowned; and the writer of the "Political Adventures of Lord Beaconsfield" will have another chapter to write up. And if Lord Beaconsfield does succeed, what will be his chief thought? Ah, to be twenty years younger!

The Florida frauds should be the chief plank of accusation against the Republican party in all the Democratic platforms for the future. No count of any indictment for high political crime was ever more atrocious than this. It is overwhelming enough to sink the most powerful administration, no matter how specious its honesty or contrite its policy; and not only Hayes, but all who assisted Hayes to the Presidency, may as well prepare for their inevitable sepulchre.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)
LONDON, June 8.
Earl Beaconsfield, accompanied by Montague Corry, Esq., his private secretary, left this afternoon for the Berlin Congress.

BERLIN, June 8.
The physicians are anxious to have the Emperor removed, and he will probably go to Badenhausen next week.

The military authorities are adopting extensive precautionary measures, and customary Whitsuntide furloughs will not be granted.

Several houses in this city were searched by the police yesterday and a number of persons were arrested.

Herr Mosh, a Socialist Member at the Reichstag, was sentenced to six weeks' imprisonment for persisting in addressing a meeting of Clemnitz after the police had declared it closed.

NEW YORK, June 9.
The Herald's Berlin despatch says: "Rumors prevail that Prince Bismarck has elaborated a complete programme for the solution of the Eastern embroglio, and intends submitting it to Congress, insisting upon its adoption *et cetera*."

LONDON, June 10.
The Standard's special from Berlin states, that a correct report of the only Judicial Examination of Nobeling before he became unconscious, shows that he said he, himself, offered to undertake the work, and discussed the plan with several persons, who approved of it.

While the Congress will assemble on Thursday, the proceedings until Saturday, will be merely formal.
