**Measures Being Taken At Queens County Jail**

Steps are now being taken to improve the security measures at the Queens County Jail in light of the report of the Grand Jury and the number of inmates who have taken "french leave" in the past few weeks. The first improvement made has been to repair the rear door which was minus its lower panel and the placing of a steel door on the outside, within the past two or three days. Workmen are presently installing some new doors and repairing others on the cells. Only two locks were in a working order on the old doors. The others, which were apparently fitted when the jail was constructed in 1911, had reached the state where they were unrepairable or non-existent. Prior to the repairing of the rear entrance, it is said, any prisoner desirous of a night on the town just crawled out through the broken panel, traversed the few yards to the back fence, from a portion of which the three strands of barbed wire was missing from the top. He would either go over the hole under the fence which was previously filled with ashes. The head jailer, Fred MacLear has resigned his position, which is now vacant. Until such time as another is appointed the job is temporarily occupied by Everett Somers, assistant jailer who is assisted by a third jailer Horace Cutcliffe. During the period that a number of escapes took place Mr. Somers was on holidays. It is expected that a new jailer will be appointed within the next few days from the number that have already made application.

**Cases Heard At Georgetown**

At magistrates court in Georgetown Wednesday, before Stendary Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet, a resident of Mt. 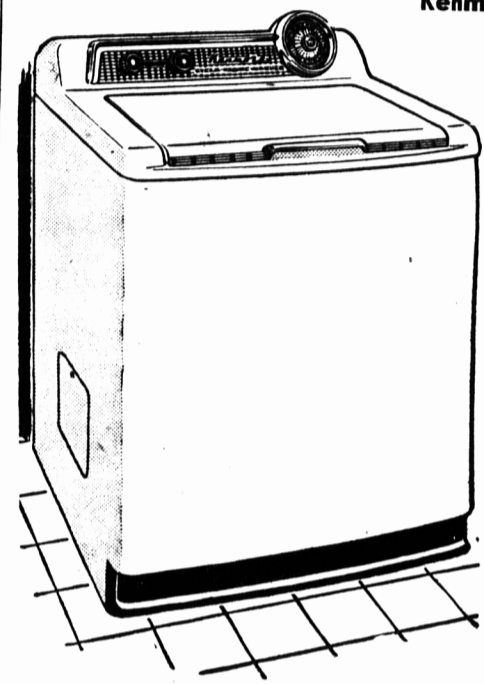
