Meeting Of United Church Presbytery

The Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met on Tuesday in Charlottetown in Trinity Church Hall with a morning and afternoon session. The devotional service was conducted by Rev. Howard Christie, Hunter River, and the Court was constituted by Rev. W. A. Paterson of Georgetown, chairman of the Presbytery.

Among the visitors present was Dr. H. W. McNeil, vice president of Mt. Allison University who outlined the plans for a tour of Prince Edward Island by the delegates of the coming Association Council of the Church which will meet in Sackville, N. B., in September. Dr. McNeil was assured of the wholehearted support of the P. E. I. Presbytery.

Presbytery paid standing honor to Rev. A. S. Weir of Cornwall, chairman of the recent convocation of Pine Hill Divinity Hall was given the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Mr. W. E. Brooks of Summerside addressed the court in the interest of the Lay Association and reported that during the past year the laymen had conducted 50 services in the churches of the Province.

Rev. A. F. MacLean of Trinity Church, Charlottetown, gave a most encouraging report on the progress of the Pine Hill Building Campaign. In the few months since this campaign had begun, he said that over \$500,000 had been subscribed and promised. He advocated a series of area meetings in which the churches of this Presbytery would consider the objectives set for this Province.

The committee of Missionary Education and Overseas Missions presented a program consisting of three brief addresses. Rev. F. W. Sawdon of Cavendish gave an historical sketch of the life and work of Rev. John Geddie and announced plans in which the Cavendish Church will celebrate a memorial service during the summer.

Mr. Russell Leard of Alberton gave an inspiring talk on the Gordon Brothers, George and James, who a century ago were missionaries from this Island to the South Seas where they were martyred.

Rev. Robert Wagner, O'Leary, outlined four significant trends in missions today. "In India, we have Evangelism," he said. "In China, we have the spirit of Christ, in India there is opposition, in Africa there is humanitarianism."

Mr. Wagner also gave a brief account of the work by Rev. Earl Leard formerly of Alberton, now serving in India.

The nominating council report was brought in by Rev. C. D. Matheson of Summerside and was as follows:

President, Rev. J. K. Campbell, North Bedeque. Secretary, Rev. R. A. MacLeod, St. Peters. Treasurer, Rev. A. J. MacDonald, Ellerslie.

Rev. L. M. Murray, Kensington, chairman of the committee on colleges and students, reported that in Canada, the United Church has 530 Candidates studying for the ministry, which he said, is the largest number ever.

As a part of this report, Miss Louise Cox, Charlottetown, was recommended into the Deaconess Order.

Presbytery endorsed this by a standing vote. Pastoral Relations Committee, in its report, recommended concurrence in the following changes: Rev. Howard Christie from Hunter River to Trinity Church in Charlottetown; Rev. J. M. Sheen from Montrose to Orwell; Vernon and the secretary was given authority to administer the call of Rev. Murray Gardner into Alberton and the Rev. D. W. MacPherson from Murray Harbor to Wainwright, Alberta. Rev. J. M. Fraser, Montague, was appointed the Ministerial Delegate from the Island Presbytery to the coming General Council at Sackville and Mr. Walter Shaw, New Dominion, was appointed the Lay Delegate. Rev. George Ward of Bedeque reported for the committee on the circulation of the United Church "Observer." Court adjourned at 6:00 o'clock.

45,000 Tons Lost
LONDON, (AP) — Lloyd's register of shipping reported Tuesday that 44 vessels totalling 45,847 tons were lost in the quarter from July 1 to Sept. 30, 1953. The biggest loser was the United States, which had to write off eight ships totalling 18,353 tons. Foundering, fire, collision and shipwreck were the major causes cited.
