CAMP BRITANNIA, Korea (AP) - This joke literally stopped the show. Rifleman William Street, Royal Ulster Rifles, of Stalybridge, Cheshire, England, said today he had told it at a POW camp show in North Korea. "I met a couple of little rats on the way to the show," he began, "and I overheard one rat ask the other, 'were you born here?'"

Tells Story Of Dramatic Stand

CAMP BRITANNIA, Korea (AP) - A survivor of the virtually annihilated Gloucester Battalion said tonight that North Koreans shot at remnants of the famed unit as they waded a white shirt of surrender until Chinese guns silenced their fellow Reds. The Chinese, who had accepted the surrender April 25, 1951, opened fire on the North Koreans and saved the British from being completely wiped out, said Cpl. Alfred Holdham of Lincolnshire, England. Released by the Communists today at Panmunjom, Holdham told the dramatic story. The trapped 1st Battalion of the Gloucesters fought gallantly in the great Chinese western front offensive of April, 1951. Their bloody battle and eventual surrender was one of the epic stories of the war.

Predicts Revolt In Soviet Orbit

WASHINGTON (AP) - George Kennan, former U. S. ambassador to Moscow, predicted Monday that revolution will break out eventually "in the Soviet orbit" and he pictured Russia's danger to the outside world as probably on the wane. Kennan, one of the top U. S. authorities on Russia, sounded a word of caution, however, against official American interference in Soviet internal troubles. Such interference, he said, might boomerang by stimulating Communist unity. Kennan was addressing a seminar on Soviet imperialism, sponsored by Baltimore's Johns Hopkins University.

To Straighten Curve On North River Road

A decision to straighten the "S" curve on North River Road at the entry to the city was made at a brief meeting of the City Council yesterday afternoon. The turn has long been regarded as dangerous and it will now be straightened in a three-way cooperative effort of the Council, City School Board and Provincial Government. A portion of land needed for the purpose will be donated by the School Board from the site of the proposed new high school. The City will then straighten the turn to the city line and have assurance from the Provincial Department of Highways that they will continue the work beyond the line. The Council met in a short session yesterday at Mayor J. D. Stewart had to receive an official call from officers commanding the warships now in port.
