Agrologists' Civil Defence Role Outlined To Members

G. B. Whiteside, Agrologist at the Dominion Experimental Farm, was the main speaker at the regular meeting of the local branch of the Agricultural Institute of Canada held at Birch Court Nov. 18th. Mr. Whiteside gave his impressions of the agrologists' forum on civil defence held recently at the Canadian Civil Defence college, Arnprior, Ont.

The president of the Charlottetown branch of the A.I.C., Edmund Arsenault, was chairman and conducted the short business meeting.

Mr. Whiteside, who is the Maritime director on the national Council of the AIC stated that the purpose of the forum was three fold:

- 1 "To inform agrologists of the existing organization for civil defence in Canada; 2 "to provide agrologists with the background knowledge of the available scientific information concerning the effects of nuclear weapons, particularly as they concern agriculture, so that agrologists may be better equipped to serve as technical advisors to provincial civil defence co-ordinators; 3 "and to discuss a draft copy of a manual entitled "Fallout on the Farm" which is being prepared by the departments of agriculture in co-operation with federal civil defence."

Mr. Whiteside stressed that civil defence was the responsibility of every citizen as it is primarily a matter of personal survival. The value of preparedness is not only in care of nuclear war but also in case of natural disasters.

Mr. Whiteside commented on the material presented at the forum and led a general discussion on the topic.

At the close of the meeting refreshments were provided by courtesy of Niagara Brand Chemicals.

Criminologist To Be Speaker

The central problem of crime and criminals will be the topic of an address to be given at the next meeting of the Canadian Club to be held at the Charlottetown Hotel November 24.

The speaker will be J. Alex Edmison, QC, who recently resigned as assistant principal of Queens University to become a member of the national parole board.

Mr. Edmison practiced law in Montreal before going overseas with the Black Watch regiment in 1940. At that time he was an alderman for the City of Montreal and a member of the board of health.

In 1945 he was appointed by UNRRA as senior officer serving in Germany. In this capacity he set up the organization for the care of refugees, disabled persons and concentration camp survivors. For this work he received citations from General Eisenhower and General Charles DeGaulle.

A writer and speaker on penology and criminology, Mr. Edmison is past president of the Canadian Penal Association and a director of the American Prison Association. For 25 years he has been interested in crime prevention, penal reform and in the civil rehabilitation of discharged prisoners from penal institutions.

Court Adjourns Customs Case

Charged under the Customs Act, Charles Murchison MacEachern of Hampton, had his case adjourned in Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday by Magistrate James B. Johnston, until Wednesday, Nov. 25, to permit the accused to obtain the advice of a lawyer.

MacEachern is specifically charged with unlawfully having possession of 400 American cigarettes, value for duty at less than \$200, on which the duty had not been paid.

Appearing for judgment, Lorne Robert Rhynes, Bayfield Street, Charlottetown was given a further adjournment on the charge of driving while intoxicated, until Nov. 26. The adjournment was given due to the absence through illness of defence counsel, Allison Gillis.

Pleading guilty to driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, James Joseph Evans of Tracadie Cross was fined \$75 and costs or seven days in jail.

Rhynes was also arraigned on a second charge, that of speeding, to which he pleaded guilty and was fined \$15 and costs or five days. Information disclosed that the accused had driven his car at a speed of 80 mph on the open highway.

A fine of \$10 and costs or five days was meted out to another person, who also pleaded guilty to a speeding offence. A second charge against the accused, operating a motor vehicle with defective equipment (lights, muffler, etc.), earned him a second fine of \$5 and costs or five days.

Convicted of operating a vehicle on the highway having a width greater than eight feet, a resident of Winsloe was fined \$10 and costs or five days. Information of the RCMP revealed that the accused had been checked operating a trailer float owned by the Pickard Machinery Co., on which he was carrying a bulldozer the blade of which extended across the roadway for

Interest In Baptist Mission Said Increasing Each Night

It is apparent that the interest in the mission of evangelism presently being held in the First Baptist Church of Charlottetown is mounting night by night. The main body of the sanctuary was filled again last evening to hear Mr. Bailey's handling of the subject "Starting the Christian Life."

The service was conducted by the pastor Rev. H.L. Mitton, who extended words of welcome to members of the various churches in the community. Special guests at the service included the following units of the Ladies' Auxiliary: Friendship Group, Martha Group, Victoria Group, Dorcas Group and the Elizabeth Group.

The guest soloist last evening was Rev. Robert Latimer, associate minister of Trinity United Church Charlottetown, who sang "I Will Pilot Thee" (Wilson). The senior choir rendered the hymn-anthem "Love Of God."

During the question-and-answer period, Mr. Bailey dealt with the question "Does Prayer Have Any Effect Upon Others?" Once again this part of the service proved most stimulating and helpful. Mr. Mitton announced that on successive evenings other questions will be considered. He also stated that on the two closing evenings of the mission Mr. Bailey would sing by request the respective selections: "Balm of Gilead" and "How Great Thou Art."

In dealing with his sermon subject "Starting the Christian Life", Mr. Bailey began by defining the Christian life as the ordinary every-day life with a plus, the additional factor being union with Jesus Christ. "Ordinary iron", he pointed out, "becomes steel when two per cent of carbon is added. So it is that Jesus Christ makes all the difference in human life."

Albert Berube Is Appointed Acting Superintendent CNR

MONCTON, - C. Albert Berube, superintendent of the Canadian National Railways' Campbellton division, has been appointed acting general superintendent, Maritime District, replacing D. W. Blair, temporarily assigned to special duties.

Announcement was made today by D.V. Gonder, vice-president and general manager, Atlantic region, who said that Mr. Berube would be replaced temporarily at Campbellton by W.R. Mitchell, who will be acting superintendent. Mr. Mitchell has been assistant superintendent, Moncton.

Claude Albert Berube was born at Ledges, N.B., joined the railway at Edmundston as messenger-operator on July 1, 1916, and remained in the service for about two months. He re-entered the railway's employ in May, 1917 as a car checker at Edmundston and in April 1921 was made statistical clerk.

In April 1925 he transferred to Moncton as chief statistical clerk and on March 18, 1930, was appointed chief timekeeper. He was named assistant superintendent, Moncton division, Jan. 12, 1943.
